President's Report

Hello to all. With the coming of September, the PAG enters its Fall Season and this year we have a tremendous lineup of exhibitions and offerings that is sure to excite our members, the community and people from outside the community as well. It is important to note that although we operate as a Society directed by its membership, our place in the community is to act as THE centre and hub for arts and culture. Our reach extends beyond our membership to students, residents and visitors alike. I welcome everyone to participate in the cultural offerings presented by the PAG this fall.

On June 22nd we hosted our Annual Art Auction which was a huge success and I would like to thank all our donors, sponsors, volunteers, workers and art loving attendees. It was a lot of fun for everyone. I added a 2005, Phillip Pearlstein lithograph – "Model with Flamingo" to my collection. The event is an ever important fundraiser which helps sustain our operations. Our next Gala Cultural event is a joint evening of music and art with the Okanagan Symphony Orchestra – "Shades Of Brilliance", Saturday, September 23rd 4:00pm – 8:00pm. The evening showcases the beautiful Ikeda Japanese Gardens filled with sounds of the OSO accompanying Live Painting and includes live and silent auctions and of course, a Gala Food Service to suit the occasion will be provided. This is our second year joint event with the OSO and we would like to build this into a major Fall Fundraiser as it is such a wonderful and enjoyable event. Please mark your calendars - I hope to see you there. Tickets are \$50 for a wonderful evening.

Also in September, PAG is presenting a very special and unique cultural event. We are honored to host the Mystical Arts of Tibet – a world tour of monks from Drepung Loseling Monastery, endorsed by the Dalai Lama. The monks arrive Wednesday September 13th and will be with us until Sunday September 17th. They will be engaged in various sacred performing and visual arts, including chanting, dancing and construction of a traditional Mandela in the main gallery. It's been 10 years since we last hosted the monks and it's an event not to be missed as the monks share their cultural traditions hoping that in doing so they will be able to make a small contribution toward world peace. In August you may have taken in the Snowbirds or the F18 Hornet fighter jets or perhaps you saw the restored B52 bomber at the airport. Here's a chance to take a different view towards world peace. Admission to the events at the Gallery is by donation.

September also kicks off our **Fall Kitchen Stove Film Series**, run in conjunction with the Toronto International Film Festival. This fall, we have an exceptional lineup of films so I recommend buying the series package: 4 films for \$38 (members & students).

And we are trying something new in our continuing education series: **arTTalks** presents **Made In Italy**, a 7 part lecture series delivered by our own Antonella De Michelis, PhD. The monthly series delivers a university quality educational program on the art of Italy. Cost of the program is only \$50 (members). Antonella usually delivers this series in Italy each summer but you will have the opportunity of receiving it right here in Penticton. This is an exceptional educational opportunity. I recommend getting your tickets early. First lecture is October 3 and runs the 1st Tuesday of each month for 7 months.

In other news, the Board is in the process of strategic planning for the future of PAG. As you should be aware by now, our 20 year lease with the City of Penticton expires October 2019. Under the terms of the lease, the land and building revert to the City of Penticton at that time. There is no renewal clause and there are no stated plans as to a future facility from which to operate the Art Gallery. So we are looking at options – including remaining where we are. There have been several reviews of the facilities we presently occupy and there are some significant upgrade requirements to comply with current code and we are also very short on space.

We wish to continue to provide meaningful exhibitions and programs for the benefit of the entire community and visitors and would like to have facilities adequate to do so. We would like to have facilities comparable to those of sports groups such as hockey, soccer and baseball/slow-pitch – only on a scale suited to our purpose. I am firmly of the belief that it is essential for a community to offer a robust and diverse set of differing opportunities and educational programs to its citizens. This certainly includes arts and cultural opportunities. I agree we should have a modern, well equipped hospital but I don't believe we should have to focus the community's charitable donations to achieve what tax payers' dollars used to provide. I was around when Gaming took over from Bingo in the 70's, and at that time, gambling was introduced as being acceptable as a government enterprise because "all" of the profits would be directed to Arts, Culture and Sports; and for a time they were. But that was short lived. Now gaming funds are used in general revenue and all non-profits are struggling to deliver their services while municipalities see this funding as another form of tax revenue. As you have likely read in the papers, Penticton has a serious unfunded liability caused by past governments failing to maintain funding for its infrastructure. Council and staff are struggling with how to deal with it. This has implications for the Library, the Museum, Memorial Arena, other sports facilities, the Trade and Convention Centre and for the Penticton Art Gallery as well. And what do you read in the paper? - We need a task force to determine if we should rebuild Memorial Arena or build two completely new sheets of ice. Hey – wait a minute. It's not just about hockey.

The arts community needs to be heard by Council, the Province and the Federal governments. If we are perceived as being complacent and accepting of token recognition, we will eventually be squeezed out of any meaningful existence. The time is now to think about what a community should be offering its citizens and what we as a community want in our lives. Our voice needs to be heard if we are to convince decision makers that Arts & Culture are a main-stay of every progressive civilization. That maybe there is another way to find peace in the world. So I welcome you to experience the events at the PAG this fall and to support the PAG. I also ask you to start the conversation amongst your colleagues and friends and politicians. Arts and culture needs your help.

Director/Curator's Report

This has certainly been a summer to remember, it was one marked by extremes and I hope not a harbinger of what's to come but an anomaly. But who am I fooling. I think this is the new normal and we are in for an unpredictable ride, one that will constantly test and challenge our ability to adapt and change at a moment's notice. After decades of pushing the limits of Mother Nature's patience it now appears that she is pushing back and reminding us of who in fact is really in charge. I am not so worried about the future of the earth as I have no doubt the resiliency of nature is far superior than ours, but rather I worry about the cost this will have on our communities and ultimately our society.

This past summer the Cariboo and Chilcotin saw unprecedented evacuations due to wild fires that started the beginning of July and are still a major and going concern having burned an unprecedented amount of British Columbia's forest and grassland. The Okanagan has had its share of tragedy over the past number of decades and as the summer comes to an end we now find ourselves once again at the mercy of Mother Nature and the four elements. Our summer was bookended by record rains; flooding and unprecedented wildfires which brought on weeks of poor air quality and as we move towards the fall, the coming rains and snow will overcome the scorched earth's ability to absorb the much needed moisture resulting in landslides and more flooding. This is the new normal and has become much faster than any of us could have imagined. Even subtle changes like the recent arrival of mourning doves both here in the Okanagan and more surprisingly up in Wells are all indicative of a dynamic shift that is going on around us.

For me, these changes are not just limited to the environment and we can also see incredible changes in our social and political world as well. While it may seem we are moving towards the dystopian worlds of Margaret Atwood, Aldous Huxley and George Orwell whose books foreshadow the dehumanization of society, the rise of totalitarian governments and the increasing frequency of environmental disasters which will culminate in the cataclysmic decline of our society and brings to mind the Chinese curse, "May you Live in Interesting Times." We travel the world looking for such events while we can have our cake and eat it right here in our back yard. Exhibition Opening Friday September 22nd 7:00 - 9:00 p.m.

Exhibition Tour & Talk on Saturday October 7th at 2:00 pm Featuring Alan Bell, son of the Artist Alistair Bell

This exhibition explores the process: deconstructing the prints and exploring its elements from the original working drawings, etching plates, wood blocks, registration guides, trial and colour proofs to the finished product. This is a unique opportunity to see the creative process, allowing a rare look into the mind of the artist and editorial process behind the creation of these iconic works of art.

Alistair Macready Bell was born in Darlington, England, in 1913 and his family immigrated to Canada in the early 1920s, settling in Vancouver in 1929. In 1935 Alistair enrolled into the Vancouver School of Art, and it would was here where he first had access to an etching press producing his first print. Over the course of the next few years he mastered a number of techniques including drypoint, etching, lithography, wood engraving and woodcuts.

While his work was strongly influenced by German expressionism, he developed a personal style, which quickly attracted the attention of his peers, critics and collectors across the country, and he soon became recognized as one of Canada's finest printmakers. By his own admission, he was always drawn to subject matter in which the linear, rhythmic quality of shape and line predominated. His work was included in numerous exhibitions across the country. Locally the Vancouver Art Gallery featured two exhibitions of his work and that of his wife Betty in 1942 and 1944. In 1951 the Vancouver Art Gallery expanded and Alistair was offered the first solo exhibition to be featured in their newly expanded gallery. He would be recognized by the Vancouver Art Gallery once again with a major solo exhibition in 1989.

Alistair Bell played an important role in the development of a distinctly west coast artistic sensibility, known today as West Coast Modernism. It was a fertile time in Vancouver, and the arts community regularly gathered at the homes of the Binning's, Adaskin's, Shadbolt's, Harris's, Koerner's. The Bell's hosted visiting artists, listening parties featuring the latest music releases, and countless social evenings where they freely shared thoughts and ideas on the latest contemporary art trends.

As Alistair's reputation grew he was awarded the prestigious C.G. Jefferys award from the Canadian Society of Graphic Artists in 1956, received a senior Canada Council travel grant in 1959, was part of a two person exhibition at the National Gallery of Canada in 1961 and a senior Canada Council scholarship in 1967. By 1967 he was successful enough to finally retire from his full-time job at Dominion Bridge in Vancouver, turning his attention to becoming a full-time artist.

He and his wife Betty loved to travel and their trips often included visits to many of the world's famous zoos sketching the exotic birds and animals they saw with many of these becoming the subject of his prints. His work was exhibited in Europe, Latin America, Canada and the US, and his works are in the Victoria and Albert Museum in England, the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the National Gallery in Ottawa. The Burnaby Art Gallery featured the first major retrospective exhibition of his work in 1971 featuring 62 works from 1935-1970. In 1982 Ian Thom at the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria featured another retrospective building on the previous Burnaby exhibition this time featuring 200 pieces dating from 1935 to 1981. Bell would eventually donate his entire print oeuvre to the permanent collection of the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria.

Thank you to Alan and Elizabeth Bell for their generosity in making this important body of work available for donation to the Penticton Art Gallery's permanent collection. In choosing the works, I was looking for something unique and educational. Not often does one get a look into the creative process and gain an understanding on how a work of art is created. This process starts with the Bell's preparatory drawings in conté, charcoal, ink, and watercolour, each one uniquely paying homage to his years working in industrial drafting. I love seeing preparatory works and comparing them to the final prints, always looking for the changes the artist made along the way as they move toward the final version.

This is a unique collection and one I hope will serve as a point of inspiration for future print makers across the province and beyond.

THE PROJECT ROOM ~ SEPTEMBER 16 - NOVEMBER 5 Kristin Krimmel | Love & Grief

Exhibition Opening Friday September 22nd 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. Exhibition Tour & Artist Talk with Kristin Krimmel on Saturday October 7th at 1:00 pm

Sooner or later, we all come to love and grief. It is part of the human condition.

In 2013, artist Kristin Krimmel lost a close friend with whom she had shared a profound love of language and literature. They delighted in the composition of words, their refined usage, depth of meaning, origins and history. In the ensuing months, feeling emotionally raw, she began to translate her grief into a visual expression of her inner turmoil. In the process she came to understand that the deepest components of friendship and its loss was simply a cycle of grief and love.

The resulting body of work was a real departure from her long standing practice, moving away from traditional materials and representational subject matter she looked for a new way to represent not only her struggles with grief but also the spirit of friend for whom she mourned. The genesis of this new direction and body of work began with the curation and defining of emotions as represented in text and it was these images that she began to upload and manipulate in Photoshop until she found the desired effect that best represented not only the mood but also the feeling the words expressed through the explorations of textual meanings and metaphorical colour.

Out of this process the following fourteen would come to make up this body of work: Inchoate, Exploration, Elation, Exposure, Intimidation, Love, Grief, Separation, Retreat, Indignation, Low Spirits, Gloom, Susceptibility and Acceptance. The panels would come to represent the seven stages of grief (as recognized by academic psychology), one of transition, and six of becoming involved in a love relationship. Ultimately these works are an expression of feelings, thoughts and experiences which could not be put into words of prose.

When the whole series was complete, she experimented and searched for a way to produce the work in a way that took into account the conceptual nature of the work while acknowledging these works were created using modern technology rather than the traditional methods that had up until then made up her art practice. After a number of experiments she found a way to do this in stark simplicity where the frame was essentially non -existent, printed with archival inks fused to aluminum panels, creating a high gloss surface that mirrors the viewer's image while contemplating the text. One of the resulting outcomes was a highly reflective surface where the images seem to come alive as reflections, both optical and metaphorical and it's in this moment of reflection where we can find echoes of our own feelings whether it be in the elation of new loves or the challenges of our losses both past and present.

While this is the most difficult body of work Krimmel has ever done and is the most personal, it's also a journey we will all experience at some point throughout our lives. How we travel though this will be unique to each and every one of us, yet in each of these works we will find commonality in the human experience. For Kristin it was through this transfiguration that she was able to find a comfort which allowed her to return to a place where love was again possible.

Of this work Kristin Krimmel writes: "I could have sunk under in grief from time to time. But because we meet the phenomenon of grief often, I decided to analyze it and somehow express it in artwork in order to work my way through it. Artists are people who take the pulse of society at various times and through these images, I want the viewer to explore her or his own cycles of love and grief – both the glory and the anguish. I want the viewer to remember the raw feelings that come with it which can be transformed with time into positive personal growth, culminating in forgiveness, understanding and healing."

This exhibition would not have been possible it not for the support and persistence of Ted Lederer who repeatedly brought Kristin Krimmel's work my attention and ultimately arranged for our meeting at her studio outside of Vancouver last year. I admire Kristin's lifelong dedication to her craft and to her courage for undertaking such a radical departure stepping outside of her area of comfort and knowledge to create this truly contemporary, timely and culturally relevant body of work. It was certainly not what I expected to see when we first met and it was what lingered with me long after I left.

We are fortunate that Kristin has also offered this body of work as a donation to the Penticton Art Gallery's permanent collection and it will add greatly to both our contemporary collection and our growing body of work exploring the art history of women in British Columbia. We also owe a great deal of gratitude to Hans-Christian Behm for the donation of the custom storage crates he made specifically for this exhibition.

Kristin Krimmel studied at UBC and at the Ecole de Beaux Arts de Reims, France; taught at Emily Carr College of Art and Design (1983-89) and has shown both locally and internationally. Kristin Krimmel is widely travelled, has undertaken art residencies at home and abroad and has been twice selected for the Joan Miro Foundation's International Drawing Competition.

"In my art practice over the years, it's the act of painting that has been a necessity to me, whether in oil, watercolor or acrylic. I like the physical immediacy of creating an image through paint and the process of making constant aesthetic decisions as each stage of the painting progresses."

Kristin Krimmel lives and works from her studio in Maple Ridge, just outside of Vancouver, British Columbia.

Exhibition Opening Friday September 22nd 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. Exhibition Tour & Talk on Wednesday September 27th at 2:00 pm | Featuring Sharon Evans

It's incredible to think that this year marks ten years of partnering with the Penticton Mental Wellness Centre and our continuing series of exhibitions exploring the parallels between creativity and mental illness. The goal of these exhibitions has always been to raise the public's awareness about mental health, foster open conversation, and promote effective coping strategies, self-care, resilience and hope throughout our community.

This annual exhibition is the outcome of an art program began in 2007 by Dr. Mark Welch, Nurse Manager of Acute Mental Health Services for the South Okanagan Similkameen. The original show included mixed media creations by persons who were hospitalized at Penticton Regional Hospital and photos from the Photovoice program co-ordinated by Canadian Mental Health Association South Okanagan Similkameen Branch.

Over the years, we have grown. Artists are now asked for a single piece as there are usually more artists than space to show all their work to advantage! The contributors are community members who may have a mental illness or the general public who want to show their support or lived experience with mental health challenges.

It's an honour to once again partner with the Penticton Mental Wellness Centre to explore parallels between creativity and mental illness and through this annual series of exhibitions we hope to raise awareness about mental health, foster open conversation, and promote effective coping strategies, self-care, resilience and hope throughout our community. Many people express the importance of art and creativity as integral to their recovery. Writing, music, painting, dance, and other arts are pleasurable activities but are conduits for expression of the self; hard to express in any other way. Art is a powerful healing tool to explore deep emotions - the sorrows, the struggles, and joys. It has the ability to transform us by awakening parts of ourselves to recover and heal from earlier traumatic memories. Through artwork, people can develop their own personal vocabularies for a fuller identity. Through the sharing of their work we can open up a greater community dialogue for a deeper and more meaningful understanding of their world and in doing so shed the stigma that haunts those who suffer from a disease that touches each and every one of us.

Over the past ten years a large part of the success of this exhibition has been the willingness of the participating artists to share not only their work but also their identity and stories with the community. The first few years we never identified the artists out of fear they would be further stigmatized, but over the years we have seen a dramatic increase in the public's understanding and knowledge and this has resulted in the individual artists being willing to publically share their stories and struggles.

In exploring this topic online there are no shortages of resources, support groups, definitions, studies and endless pages exploring the parallels and correlations between creativity and mental illness. One of those pages Wikipedia states: "...it has been proposed that there is a particular link between creativity and mental illness (e.g. bipolar disorder, whereas major depressive disorder appears to be significantly more common among playwright, novelists, biographers, and artists.) Association between mental illness and creativity first appeared in literature in the 1970s, but the idea of a link between "madness" and "genius" is much older, dating back at least to the time of Aristotle. The Ancient Greeks believed that creativity came from the gods, in particular the Muses (the mythical personifications of the arts and sciences, the nine daughters of Zeus). Romantic writers had similar ideals, with Lord Byron having pleasantly expressed, "We of the craft are all crazy. Some are affected by gaiety, others by melancholy, but all are more or less touched".

When asked to contribute some background information on the exhibition, Valerie Wood, the exhibitions volunteer organizer sent in the following excerpt from an article by Gayle Bluebird entitled, Using the Arts to Recover Mental Health, published in the Mental Health Recovery Newsletter 1.3, Copyright: Mary Ellen Copeland, 2000.

"Many people express the importance of art and creativity as integral to their recovery. Writing, music, painting, dance, and other arts are pleasurable activities but are conduits for expression of the self which is hard to express in any other way. Art is a powerful healing tool to explore deep emotions - the sorrows, the struggles, and joys. It has the ability to transform us by awakening parts of ourselves to recover and heal from earlier traumatic memories. Through artwork, people can develop their own personal vocabularies for a fuller identity.

Persons who are creating with the arts have things in common to talk about; they can meet over a cup of coffee, critique each other's work, discuss reviews of professional artists and writers, and attend performances together. The inspiration that can be derived from other people's performances and works can lead to the development of their own art. For example, performances by local musicians who are sensitive and expressive may serve as inspiration for their own song or poem.

Art and creativity can be used by anyone - that is what is so exciting. It does not require being taught or require a therapist to help one be creative. Some may want to be observers or dabble in a "fun" experience. Art for some may be writing a journal, creating a garden, or making a recipe. Others may

take photographs of something that is particularly inspiring to them, or draw cartoons. Some artists may want to perfect their art - to "plumb the depths" so to speak - which takes practice and "doing." There is a place for everyone."

This year we are also proud to partner with Penticton's Unity House and Marcela A. Toro Garland who facilitated a Therapeutic Art Class entitled 'Drawing Fundamentals', at Unity for a period of ten months. Over that period she designed the program as a cognitive therapeutic activity for people experiencing Mental Health issues and who were in great need to enhance their overall sense of wellbeing. The art class, even though it coached participants on use of materials and basic drawing skills, mostly represented a pleasurable activity for those afflicted by depression and/or other severe mental health ailments. The focus was not placed on the end product, but rather on process; thus, boosting self-esteem and sense of accomplishment. Her goal was to help contribute in the creation of safe environment where individuals could explore creativity.

Marcela A. Toro Garland has worked for years in the Social Services field, particularly with victims of trauma. She was instrumental in the expansion of an Immigrant Settlement & Adaptation Program for the whole South Okanagan region. Due to her ability with languages, she encountered many clients afflicted by PTSD and displacement due to both civil and foreign conflicts. After this extensive experience it was a natural progression to develop an interest and later a more in-depth understanding on Wellness & Healing. In conjunction with this work, Marcela is an accomplished visual artist. <u>www.toro</u> <u>-garland.ca</u>
