# Director | Curator's Report

First off, I would like to remind you all to pencil in the date of Wednesday, May 30<sup>th</sup>, so you can join us for our Annual General Meeting which will get started in the gallery Tea Room at 6 pm. This is your chance to come down and hear firsthand how things have been going at the gallery over the past year and to engage with the board and staff, and present us with any questions or concerns you may have. This is also your opportunity to elect those individuals who will serve as your representatives on the board of directors over the coming year. The meeting will be followed by our annual Volunteer and Donor Appreciation Party and will feature a selection of beverages and light refreshments. This is also our opportunity to publicly thank and recognize all those incredible individuals, organizations, businesses and funding partners who have helped make the gallery more dynamic, vibrant and stronger over the past year trough their generosity of time, financial and in-kind support. We couldn't exist and operate at the same level without your support, belief and ongoing dedication to the Penticton Art Gallery and our efforts. I am really proud at all we have accomplished over the past year and the direction the gallery is moving and I am excited to share these accomplishments with you.

This past weekend I was blessed to have been invited along with the Kelowna-based artist Lee Claremont to act as jurors for the Peace Liard Regional Arts Council's annual exhibition which was held in Fort Nelson this year. It was my first time and I was amazed at the depth and breadth of talent displayed by the 43 participating artists who submitted over 90 works in a wide variety of media for our consideration. I really treasure these moments as they afford me the chance to connect to a larger art community and discover the work of a whole new group of artists and region of the province. I have known Lee Claremont for 12 years and have worked with her previously at the En'owkin Centre, but the past three days really afforded me the opportunity to reconnect and learn more about her life and work. She is a class act and I look forward to being in touch more often.

I would like to thank Donna Kane, President of the Peace Liard Regional Arts Council for inviting me to be a part of this exciting event and for her time and dedication to ensuring this was the success it was. While there she also found time to hold a book launch and a reading from her latest book, Summer of the Horse, which chronicles her journey into the wilderness with her then new husband Wayne Sawchuk as he embarked on his annual three month wilderness guiding expedition into the Muskwa-Kechika protected wilderness reserve in Northeastern British Columbia. From what I heard and from what I have read so far, it's a truly compelling read and one I would encourage anyone who has romantic visions of exploring the wilds of British Columbia to pick and read this summer. I would also like to give a huge shout-out to Doug Roper, the General Manager of the Phoenix Theatre, a truly inspiring man who against all the odds is fighting and evolving to keep the arts and culture alive and relevant in his community. I am in awe of his passion for the arts and dedication to his community and, as they say, he is all in, having invested everything he has into this theatre and, in spite of a contracting population base and tough economic times, he has visions of growth and expansion. I wish that every community could have its own Doug Roper and we could see a true renaissance in the arts across the province; especially throughout rural BC where housing and studio space is not only plentiful but affordable. I do believe the arts can be an economic driver and I wish communities like Fort Nelson could further develop and attract more artists to take advantage of the resources and infrastructure that exist to better their community and economic viability. It would take a courageous council to turn its focus on the arts and culture, away from a resource-based economy. There is no shortage of evidence of the long term economic viability and social value of such an investment in the arts and culture, and besides, the resource companies will always return and inevitably go when it suits their economic interests best.

This past weekend served to reaffirm my passion and belief in the power and importance of the arts to the development of a healthy and dynamic community and the power a few passionate individuals can have to inspire and lift others up to achieve something quite fantastic. This won't be my last visit to that part of the province and I hope to have the opportunity to introduce some of the artists I met this past weekend to audiences here in the southern part of the province.

The print studio at the Shatford Centre is just about up and running and has an incredible core group of artists leading the charge. To start off the main focus of the studio will be on lithography, (continued on page 4)

# President's Report

Last issue I gave a report on the status of our building/property lease with the City of Penticton. As you will recall the current lease expires October 1, 2019 and the current terms state the land and building revert to the City at that time with no provision for renewal. Further, at one point, there was some discussion by City staff that the City may want to then sell the property for real estate development. Well, your Building Committee has had our first meeting with City staff on the matter and I am pleased to report the discussions went very well. The general consensus is that City staff is looking favorably at recommending a renewal or continuation of the lease and there are no known plans to sell or develop the property. This is good news for the future of the Gallery. Our building has considerable useful life in it and we are planning to stay. We have scheduled a follow up meeting with City Staff in May. The purpose of this meeting is to begin discussions as to what a new lease would look like. There are a number of significant issues to resolve. We are desperately in need of additional storage space and both on-site and off-site locations are being considered. There may also be an opportunity to share space with the Museum, as they are also in need of additional storage. Then, there are various upgrades that are required. Some of these are considered quite urgent while others could occur sometime in the future. These involve our HVAC system, fire alarm and electrical systems and some building code upgrades. In addition to these necessities, there is the potential for upgrades to our interior and exterior lighting as well as to signage. We are currently obtaining cost estimates. The bottom line is, whatever lease term is negotiated, there will be some significant costs to remain where we are. The building is currently owned by the City, however the terms of our existing lease state we (Penticton Art Gallery Society) are required to pay for all upgrades. This then will become another point of discussion and negotiation with the City.

It is here I would like to enter a broader discussion with our members and with the community at large. Different communities place different values on their recreational and cultural amenities and opportunities. Generally, the more private a user group is, the more it contributes to funding its amenities. The reverse is also true; parks, pools, arenas and museums are considered "public" and are generally funded by taxpayers. Art Galleries can fall in-between. Some are more private while others strive to benefit the entire community, including its visitors. For more than two decades the PAG has played a pivotal role in delivering a wide variety of Arts & Cultural programming to the community. The Gallery is accessible to all regardless of income and significant efforts are made to make the Gallery inclusive both demographically and culturally. Our programs are designed specifically for children to seniors and across diverse cultures. We also engage in social commentary in a respectful and meaningful way. The Arts Community is growing significantly in the Okanagan and PAG is at the forefront of this development, making a very significant contribution to the quality of life here in Penticton and beyond. In addition, we maintain an extensive and curated permanent art collection, which the Society holds for the benefit of residents of the City of Penticton. Our incorporating documents ensure that upon any dissolution of the Society, this collection is not distributed to members but is transferred to the City or a not-for-profit body like PAG. As such, the PAG receives both public and private funding.

At this next stage in our evolution, I would like to engage the community in assessing how we should continue for perhaps the next twenty years, as we enter into a new lease of our premises. How much of an investment is the community willing to undertake to see the continued growth in PAG programs and services? And how should this be funded?

I would like to thank you for your continued support of the Gallery ask you to continue the discussion as City Council needs to assess the mood of its citizens. We will be presenting our case in the upcoming negotiations. I hope to see you at the upcoming AGM as well as at our Annual Art Auction Fundraiser.

# In Sense: Skyler Punnett, Works 2015-2018

For over twenty years the Meadowlark Festival has commissioned a well known artist from British Columbia each year to create a piece of art to be used in its annual promotions and fundraising efforts. In each of their choices there runs a common thread that ties together the careers of each of these artists ,regardless of where they are on the arc of their journey: as professional artists each of them has staked a significant part of their creative efforts on creating work in inspired by nature and raises awareness of the importance of our stewardship of the land. The British Columbia landscape is special, unique, and so are the artists that inhabit it and over the years the Meadowlark Festival has invited and engaged an impressive list of important artists to create their poster each year including such notables as: Allan Brookes, J. Fenwick Landsdown, Robert Bateman, Lee Claremont, Jan Little, Julia Hargreaves and most recently Dorothy Tinning to name just a few. This year we are please to welcome Skyler Punnett to this elite list of exhibitors.

Skyler's artist statement: "For Meadowlark I wanted to highlight the bird's connection to the land and the interconnected web of life that it is a part of. The tall grasses hide the Meadowlark, Big Sage provided shelter from the summer sun and a myriad of insects roam the undergrowth for the birds to prey on. The composition is intended to evoke the whirling interconnectedness of the grasslands, while the stark, simplified colour scheme highlights the flash of colour the Meadowlark lends to the landscape in the dry summer months."

In writing about his own process, motivations and his accompanying exhibition at the Penticton Art Gallery Skyler writes: "Home is more than a place. It is an embodied feeling that comes and goes in relation to our felt sense of connection. Like sight, sound and touch, it is either there, or it is not. Without the stimulus of home, the sense of being there cannot be embodied. We need it to feel it.

In Sense is a collection of works created upon Skyler Punnett's return home to Penticton after 10 years living on the coast. The subject matter is comprised of the natural flora and fauna of the Okanagan, while the spirit strives to address the differing and often conflicting emotional connections one experiences to home. From reverence to revulsion, home has many forms and flavours, especially after time spent away."

Skyler Punnett has been a commercial artist for the last 10 years and after many years living and working in Vancouver he has returned to his home town of Penticton where he has helped create a cultural tsunami. As a commercial artist his impressive list of clients include: Sony Entertainment, Microsoft, Nokia and Rainmaker Media. He has worked as an illustrator, storyboard artist and art director in a variety of media including animation, mobile gaming and traditional illustration. His style combines figurative work with organic, flowing, natural subject matter that lends itself to a wide variety of applications including animation, packaging and stand alone work. Thanks to our three regional high school art teachers; Shauna Reid at Penticton High School, Brad Gibson, at Princess Margaret and Aleita Lloyd at Summerland Secondary, for your inspiring leadership.

There's no doubt that the arts are fun for kids. Diving into those finger paints and making a beautiful picture to hang on the fridge is awesome. Acting in a play is exhilarating. But the arts also help kids develop on many fundamental levels. Here are the top 10 ways that numerous studies have proven the arts help kids learn and grow: 1. Creativity, 2. Improved Academic Performance, 3. Motor Skills, 4. Confidence, 5. Visual Learning, 6. Decision Making, 7. Perseverance, 8. Focus, 9. Collaboration, 10. Accountability.

Thanks to these teachers for inspiring their students and creating life long skills and earning opportunities which may manifest themselves in many different forms other than the visual arts. Thanks also to the students for having the courage to share with us a window into their world. For those of us who don't have children this exhibition is always a fascinating view into the thoughts, interests and concerns of our youth and by extension our future.

#### Princess Margaret Secondary School Visual Art Program

Students in the Visual art program at Maggie started their school year with a very inspiring visit to the Penticton Art Gallery. Seeing works by the likes of Jim Logan, Joseph Sanchez and Janice Iniskimaki Tanton gave us all lots to reflect upon as human beings. I have always felt that it is one thing to share with students the importance of being exposed to a wide variety of materials and processes in which we can express ourselves creatively; but, it is also necessary to see how art can be used as a visual tool to create awareness about the wrongs of our past. These three artists all brought a very powerful visual message that allowed for some very thoughtful discussions about a subject that has for the most part been avoided for many years.

As a part of the healing process for this first show, my students also had an opportunity to visit the gallery when the Monks from Tibet were here. The incredible detail and patience these individuals displayed inspired my senior classes to produce their own Mandalas. Each drawing shared the same circle within a square format, but allowed each student an opportunity to visually portray their own unique stories about their lives.

I stumbled upon some free wood in one of the local manufacturing plant dumpsters in the fall of 2017. I thought this

might be a nice alternative surface for students to use with painting this year. The students in (continued on page 8) the senior art classes were asked to allow for some part of the original grain of the wood to be left exposed within their composition. Each student then used images that interested them in which to play around with smooth or rough painterly techniques. It is always great to see the wide variety of images and ways that students go about using the paint to produce interesting visual effects. We called these paintings "Bored" paintings. Yes, a bad pun, but I like to remind the kids that in this time of technological distractions we can always pull ourselves out states of boredom by engaging in painterly processes!

It is hard to reinvent the wheel every year with projects so I decided to revisit the "Spirit Mask" project with the junior classes this year. Students learned a variety of hand building techniques and approaches to creating masks out of clay. Each were encouraged to be original with their masks designs and given lots of opportunities to be playful with visual textures and colors in their final creations.

Also featured in this year's show is a series of acrylic portraits by the junior classes. Since I had plenty of free panels of wood left over from my dumpster days in the fall, I asked each student in the junior grades to choose a portrait image that inspired them. Students then used some of our preliminary skill building techniques to develop the overall image by playing around with contrasting dark and light effects. I really enjoyed seeing the bold use of color and playful development of shapes that exist within the portrait images!

As always, I extend a huge thank you to the Penticton Art Gallery for giving the high school students in School District #67 an opportunity to showcase their skills and creativity in this annual year end show.

As always, it has been a busy year in the art studio at Pen-High. The students are excited to be part of this show and display their hard work. #### Summerland Secondary School Visual Art Program

My main goal for my students is to instill in them the idea that they are all on an artistic journey. Whatever medium or technique they work in, I want them to understand that pursuing art is an ongoing learning experience. One successful, or unsuccessful project, or work of art, should not define one as an artist. It is the lifelong art practice of experimenting, improving on or learning new skills, and creating a conversation with the viewer, where one grows as an artist.

Many students (and adults, for that matter) have a mindset that you either are, or aren't, an artist. My push back to that is: Is one born a writer, or scientist, or mathematician? There can be innate skill, but there are many artists for whom success did not come easily, and they had to put in many practice hours to hone their skill and find their creative voice. The new BC curriculum for Fine Arts really speaks to this idea of the artist growing through time. This means success and failure, and that each is rewarded for the effort and creative problem solving the individual undertook on their journey of art making.

The projects were designed to help students through this journey of skill building, developing creativity, and their own personal voice. Some projects had multiple processes, and others were simply for students to play and understand colour theory, or use of space. The student work represents only a part of who they are as an artist, and I'm excited for you to share in their experience.

# From the Vault: Remembering Jill Leir Salter and Frances Harris

A peak into the Penticton Art Gallery's Permanent Collection

The Penticton Art Gallery prioritizes the safe holding of artwork by notable local and regional artists; regardless, it should come as no surprise that our archive is brimming with work inspired by the stunning locale of the Okanagan Valley. From early hand-tinted photographs by Lumb Stocks to dreamy watercolours and bold oil paintings to abstracted serigraphs, the permanent collection of the PAG showcases a vibrant and diverse range of interpretations of this beautiful environment we call home.

Last year, the community bid farewell to two long-term, prolific artists who documented the unique characteristics of the Okanagan Valley. The first was Jill Leir Salter (b. 1924, Penticton), of the pioneering Leir family and also, coincidentally, the great-Aunt of this year's Meadowlark Nature Festival artist, Skyler Punnett. Jill was a member of the Tumbleweed Collective up until her passing in February of 2017. An enthusiastic lover of nature, her preferred medium was watercolour as it allowed her to spontaneously and expressively capture the landscape that so fascinated her.

The second artist is Frances Harris (b. 1913, England), who passed away in October 2017 at the incredible age of 104 years old. Frances, though legally blind by this time, was still producing paintings at the age of 99, which, according to the Lloyd Gallery, are amongst the best pieces she ever created. Photographs do not do justice to the vibrancy and movement captured in her brushstrokes. Several years ago an endowment fund was created through the sale of a number of Frances' works; the Community Foundation of the South Okanagan distributes this prize annually to a chosen student attending the fine arts program at UBCO, thus encouraging the next generation of Okanagan artists.

Mondrian inspired display re-invigorates gift shop merchandising







Visitors to the Penticton Art Gallery over the last few weeks may notice that our Art Preparator Glenn Clark was madly busy, and the Gift Shop was in some disarray. Rest assured that – after some growing pains – what has emerged from this messy larval and pupal stage is a wonderful butterfly. The finished product: a permanent Mondrian-inspired window shelving to replace our current temporary shelving.

Piet Mondrian (1872-1944) is one of the pioneers of 20<sup>th</sup> century abstract art, and one of the greatest artists of his time. In Mondrian style, rectangles in primary colours of transparent vinyl have been adhered to sections of the Gift Gallery windows between shelves, creating the effect of an abstract art piece.

"Laying it out on the floor [to work out the plan] is like putting together a giant jigsaw puzzle," says Glenn Clark.

Not only will this plan make the shelving more secure, it will free floor space in the cramped little shop, and allow the Gallery to maximize its profits from sales over the busy summer season. We will continue to offer as much as we can of our usual Gift Gallery services, and invite you to drop in and check out our retrofitted shop.

# **Public Sculpture in Penticton**

Annual Public Sculpture Exhibition unveils new work on May 11th 2018

Sculpture brings so much to our community – a chance to stop and reflect, an opening to chat with neighbours and visitors, a sense of belonging, an opportunity to learn a story, and development of pride in the beauty and grace of our city.

Penticton has a history of supporting public sculpture including participation in a 2002 Sculpture competition that left a legacy of works including The Romp, Who's in Charge and Penticton Ancestors (3 of over 20 sculptures and monuments in our city).

In 2015 the Arts, Culture and Creative Innovations Committee of the City of Penticton created the Public Sculp-

ture Subcommittee and charged it with developing an ongoing commitment to public art with a focus on sculpture. As a result in 2017, the City launched the **Penticton Public Sculpture Program**. Six sculptures were displayed along the Okanagan Lake waterfront and downtown. Community response to the installations was overwhelmingly positive not to mention the 100's of photographs taken by visitors and residents!

Our 2018 program will showcase 6 new pieces and will begin with a reception and artist's talks at the Penticton Art Gallery, Friday, May 11 at 7 PM. The official opening will take place on the steps of City Hall Saturday, May 12 at 10 AM. At the opening walking maps will be distributed and some of the artists will be at their sculptures, after the opening, to meet the public and tell the story of their work.

We would like the sculptures to stay beyond their year visit. Consider sponsoring the purchase of any of the installations. Perhaps your business would like to sponsor, lease or purchase one or a group you belong to would like to leave a legacy in the city? Contact me and we can make this happen. At the time of print we are anticipating the sale of one of the 2017 sculptures making it a permanent installation. Stay tuned for that exciting development!

Another way to support sculpture is the Penticton Public Art Fund. Held by the Community Foundation of the South Okanagan Similkameen (CFSOS) its purpose is to provide grants for the purchase/ creation of public art in Penticton. 


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






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
