### In Memoriam | Beverley Ann Reid (1936-2019)

Beverley was born in Regina, Saskatchewan receiving her Fine Arts Diploma from the University of Manitoba in 1956. Upon graduation Bev worked as a display designer before she moving to San Miguel de Allende with fellow artist Don Reichert and her future husband Richard Reid. After her six month Mexican sojourn, Bev became Chief Designer for Walker Display Co. in Vancouver.

Richard would soon follow and they were married on February 27th, 1960 and left the very next day for Europe. They explored the continent in a VW camper before settling and working in London. She and Richard established a display business where she designed and made window design props, mostly fiberglass works, for several major retailers, including Harrods, Selfridges, and Liberty. This highly successful endeavour afforded Bev and Richard the luxury of working for three or four months a year, and travelling and painting for the remaining months.

In 1964 the VW van was shipped to New York and Bev and Richard drove it across Canada to make their home in Richmond, BC. Bev had a studio built on their property and continued her innovative fiberglass works until eventually finding her passion in fabric arts. After purchasing land at Christina Lake, summers were spent developing their property and home, and in 1979 they moved in.

Although Beverley shied away from the limelight, she left her mark on the arts community. She was a co-founder of the Grand Forks Art Gallery and served as its first curator from 1984-1989. Her own work was displayed in many group exhibitions throughout the country and one of her numerous solo exhibitions toured as far away as Spremberg, Germany. Beverley's most recent collection, *Hanging by a Thread*, was exhibited at Gallery 2 in 2013.

### Julie Oakes: SheShe Bench 1775 Gallery | November 21, 2019 through January 12, 2020

"She She: a double affirmation of the feminine - an aesthetic high."

The origins of the term chi chi may come from *chic* used by Flaubert in Madame Bovary, *chicard* being, at the time, current Parisian slang for classy. Italians say *fare una bella figura* which means 'make a good impression'. Baroness Von Hoyningenheune used chi-chi for an overthe-top 'turn out' that results in an even greater edification, a *super* impression. *SheShe* is a channel into focusing perception towards the feminine.

SheShe presents a traditional domestic setting and elevates it to affirm the strength of women. Women have long decorated the home with motifs derived from nature, recognizing nature as the ultimate designer employing combinations of randomness, symmetry, repetition, and effective engineering. Using artistic disciplines that originated in embellishing the home, *SheShe* claims feminine stylistic empathy through craft, design, and textiles. By phrasing tropes for women within objects designed to be impressive, the feminine vocabulary is raised.

Lucy R. Lippard's *The Pink Glass Swan: Selected Essays in Feminist Art* challenged the institutionalized sexism of the art world in the 70s by titling a serious discourse after an ornament - pink for a girl, fragile, floaty and kitsch. *SheShe* reasserts the significance of the domestic

setting as an opportunity to beautify and decorate while embedding a powerful message and aesthetic. *SheShe* is an installation suggesting an interior domestic space.

Julie Oakes uses painting, ceramics, glass, performance, print making, and video to address environmental protectionism, women's rights, spiritualism, and cultural diversity. She has had solo museum exhibitions in Canada at The Vernon Art Gallery, The Canadian Clay and Glass Museum, The Penticton Art Gallery, The Varley Museum, The Canadian Museum of Northern History, The Alternator Gallery, and RCA Visuals. International solo exhibitions include Rivington Gallery, London, and The Temple Gallery, Nassau, Bahamas. Recent invitational museum group exhibitions include Interwoven, Lodz, Poland, Kanadishe Woken, Germany, and the Anchorage Museum of Art. She holds a Masters in Visual Arts, NYU, and a Masters in Social and Political Science, New School for Social Research, New York. After living in Toronto, Oakes, with Richard Fogarty, moved back to Vernon where they designed and built Headbones Gallery and her studio.

### Under 500 Exhibition + Sale

Project Room + Toni Onley Gallery | November 21, 2019 through January 12, 2020

Each year the gallery puts a call out to artists of all kinds to submit three artworks all priced under \$500. This exhibition receives interest from artisans, crafters, and visual artists working in all media from across British Columbia.

Some of you forward-planners may already be underway in your holiday purchases, while others leave their shopping until last minute. Regardless, this annual show is always something to check out, whether it be a gift for a friend, loved one, or that perfect little something for yourself.

This exhibition is open to any artist who wants to submit. It not only provides us with some tempting, unique, and wonderful gifts, but an excellent cross-section of the talent and artistic happenings in our community. The mixture of artists range from professional exhibiting artists to teenagers showing their work for the first time, and everything in between!

We make sure the show is hung for our Soup Bowls Project which is running its 23rd year on November 14th and 15th. Roughly 200 people are in the gallery each night and it's a great kick-off to the sale.

#### Artwork can be dropped off at the gallery between October 18, 2019 and November 7, 2019. No work will be accepted after this date.

### The Rules:

- All artwork must be **original** and ready for gallery display. All works, where appropriate, should be framed with properly installed hardware.
- Art must be created by the person that is submitting the work. This exhibition is not a secondary market.
- All works must be priced under \$500 and must be for sale. No NFS works will be displayed.
- Sixty five (65%) of the selling price will be paid to the artist at the conclusion of the exhibition period. All cheques for works sold will be processed and issued in January 2020. The Penticton Art Gallery will retain thirty five (35%) of the selling price.
- Each artist can submit up to three (3) pieces.
- The artist must include a hard copy of their CV and/or Artist Statement for an information binder when they drop off their work at the gallery.
- Unsold works must be picked up from the gallery by January 31, 2020. Work not picked up by January 31st will be considered abandoned.
- Each work submitted must be accompanied by a contract found on our website or at the gallery.


#### Tall Tales Lecture by Bill Blair


Penticton artist Bill Blair will discuss his earliest influence, the tall-tale postcard – most popular in the early part of the 20th Century – and illustrate his photomontage process, from his first works in the 1980s, to his later hand-tinted pieces. Much of his imagery fluctuates between themes of Canadiana and Mexicana, both real and imaginary. Both play off ideas of early 20th-Century romantic travel ideals, issues of souvenir culture, and national identity in North America.

A recipient of several Canada Council for the Arts and British Columbia Arts Council awards, his work has been featured in London's The Daily Mail, Geist Magazine, National Public Radio, CTV News, CBC Television, and Western Living Magazine.

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


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
