EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

What a change since last we met. In early March we were riding high on excitement in anticipation of the Bob Ross exhibition, planning a record-breaking paint-in, and getting ready for packed Spring Break kids camps. In the span of five days, we went from being in full swing to announcing postponements, then cancellations, and finally, hunkering down at home. Closure to the public, temporary layoffs, and working from home have completely changed the day to day life at the Gallery and have forced us to redefine how and what we do. Trying to reshape our business model for a world that is in the throes of a seismic shift has required enormous flexibility, backup plans layered upon backup plans, and staying optimistic.

With the safety of both Pentictonites and Gallery staff top of mind, we have been closed to the public since March 18th. We hope to reopen to staff in May, and to the public in June. Few things are certain, but one thing we can be sure of is that it will look a little different at the Gallery. Physical distancing rules will be in place, meaning layout modifications, reduced building capacity, frequent disinfection, plexiglass shields, and those marvellous dots on the ground we are all getting used to seeing. With vigilance on our part, we are confident we can safely offer access to exciting, thought-provoking exhibitions as we move forward in this new landscape.

Of everything we do, our programming and events will

be subject to the most modifications. This year's AGM will be virtual, held on Zoom on June 3, 2020 at 6:30pm. Never fear, you will receive notices with the necessary links. Educational programming will be coming online, with tutorials, workshops, artist talks, and in-depth looks at the Permanent Collection. The challenges to fulfilling our mandate under these new conditions are real, but so are the opportunities. Now is the time to push past "the way it's always been done" and explore new and exciting avenues.

We look forward to seeing you all again soon - from 2 metres away.

Remaining Spring Season Cancelled





MY LIFE'S JOURNEY

Online Exhibition May 2020

One of the Penticton Art Gallery's longest running partnerships has been with the Okanagan's nationally acclaimed Meadowlark Festival. Each year, in conjunction with the Festival, the Gallery hosts a solo exhibition by the Festival's featured artist. For the first time, we have moved this exhibition online in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The history of this partnership is filled with some of the best known artists living and working in British Columbia, including: Robert Bateman, James Lansdowne, Terry Isaac, Alex Fong, Skyler Punnett, Laila Campbell, Lee Claremont, Julia Hargreaves, Dorothy Tinning, Angie Roth McIntosh, Bethany Handfield, and Dr. Murray Roed.

This year, the honour was bestowed upon one of Penticton's most loved artists – Dr. Michael Sime. He was recognized by the arts community with the 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award, given by the Penticton and District Arts Council.

Dr. Sime's equally distinguished career saw him working as an obstetrician and gynaecologist in Europe, Central Africa, and Canada. He is known throughout the Okanagan and beyond



for his whimsical drawings, in particular his hallmark duck which finds itself in each of his works.

Sime has spent the last 7 decades exploring and working in a variety of media, including pottery, painting, and drawing.

Following his retirement, he first threw his creative energies into pottery, working with clay, creating pots and sculptures. He moved from 3D to 2D, returning to the source of his first success and recognition as an artist – drawing and painting.

Sime lives and works out of his home and studio on Skaha Lake where he continues to paint daily. In addition to this exhibition, he has a solo exhibition scheduled in Italy. He continues to develop a line of merchandise inspired by his art, and is developing a book of his art and poetry.

Thank you for sharing your art with the world, which we hope will encourage others to pursue their own creative projects.

Due to the nature of the exhibition, the works will not be returned. They will be kept as an archive, documenting this moment in our cultural history, by the Penticton Art Gallery. The collection will be made available for loan to other galleries and museums across the globe.









PERMANENT COLLECTION

The Permanent Collection consists of over 2,500 works of art, including sculpture, painting, works on paper, and photography. We have been building the Permanent Collection in trust of the citizens of Penticton since our formal registration as a society nearly 50 years ago. The scope of the Collection ranges from rare 19th-century views of the Similkameen Valley, to historic and contemporary examples of Inuit and Aborigional art, to works documenting local contemporary artists, to those who have found national and international fame.

Items in our Collection range from a single object by an individual artist, to collections of hundreds of works documenting the development of an artist's work over the course of their lifetime. This makes our Collection unique as it provides insight into the mind of the artists, and provides not only an incredible teaching tool, but serves as an opportunity to see the development through their careers.

Some of our holdings include:
Toni Onley (1928-2004) close to 90 works from 1942-2002;
Alistair Macready Bell (1913-1997) close to 90 works from 1947-1997; Joseph Plaskett (1917-2014) close to 100 works from 1946-1990s; Jack Shadbolt (1909-1998) close to 90 works from the 1930s-1990s;
Judith Foster (1930-2000) close to 100 works from the 1950s-1990s; Minn
Sjølseth-Carter (1919-1995) close to 50 works from the

1950s-1990s; Bettina Somers (1904-1987) close to 100 works from the 1940s-1980s; Julia Bullock-Webster (1826-1907) a collection of works from the 1870s-1890s; Kathleen Daly (1898-1994) a collection of works from the 1940s-1970s; Muriel Ferley (1926-2008) a collection of works from the 1950s-1990s.

We are working to make this resource accessible to the public and scholars through our website. We are always searching for additional information pertaining to the artists whose work we have in our holdings. If you have any information you think could be of interest, we invite you to contact us.

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


