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MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Welcome back! Effective June 8th, the Penticton Art Gallery re-opened (slowly, safely) to the public. After a two and a half-month hiatus, it feels good to be back. Things are different, certainly, but our commitment to bringing you exceptional exhibitions and programming remains unchanged.

June 3rd, we held our Annual General Meeting in a new-to-us format, via Zoom. Only six of us were present in the building, and the rest joined us all on the screen. Quorum was easily met, the process was relatively smooth, and we accomplished this critical piece of business in a record 36 minutes. While we are pleased with the success of the meeting, we remain hopeful that next year we can reinstate the in-person AGM experience. Our Annual Report and 2019 Financials can now be found in digital version on our website, with printed copies available at Reception.

At the AGM we welcomed several new faces to our Board of Directors. We are now graced with 9 dedicated individuals – make sure to say hello to them at our events! Take a peek at the new roll call, on page two, to get the details.

Back in March, our staff were chomping at the bit to delve into the Bob Ross exhibition, and the Arts Letter was bursting at the seams with tied programming, events, and gift shop goodies. And then came Covid, and like everyone else, we postponed, we cancelled, we made new plans. Now, Saturday July 4th, we are so very pleased to bring you a completely re-thought Bob Ross show, complete with a socially distanced exhibition opening.

We have made a very thorough examination of how to offer this exhibition opening safely: we drew up minutely detailed written procedures and battle plans; everyone involved will be outfitted with appropriate safety gear; and social distancing measures, sanitization protocols, and limitations on gatherings will be strictly adhered to. We want you safe, we want us safe, and we want BOB!

That said, the opening day should be a lot of fun: bubble shows, live music, a DJ, creative theatrical performances, and a giant community paint-by-numbers are some of the treats we have in store for you, as well as the immersive experiences throughout the Gallery. We can't wait to see you there.

The day after the opening, we will switch over to our new summer hours: through July and August, we will be open 7 days a week for your enjoyment and edification. Weekdays will run from 10-5, and weekends from 11-4.

On the heels of opening day excitement, we will welcome children to our longstanding Creative Kids Summer Camps, which sold out almost immediately upon our re-opening. The same thoroughness with regards to safety that we are bringing to our exhibitions is being applied to our camps. Expect to see reduced class sizes, a rejigged curriculum accommodating safety requirements, and diligence with respect to hygiene.

During the Summer Exhibitions, your journey through the Gallery spaces will be one-way only. We have created a circuit for you which ensures all the proper measures are in place for your safety and enjoyment of the artwork. Self-guided tour brochures will enhance the experience. Here's to a slow and steady summer, full of responsible fun!

HAPPY LITTLE ACCIDENTS

July 4 to September 13, 2020 Bench 1775 Gallery

The Penticton Art Gallery is thrilled to present the first-ever Canadian exhibition of the internationally celebrated pop culture icon and American artist, Bob Ross. I, like millions of others, was captivated and seduced into the world of art by his public television series The Joy of Painting. Like millions before me it was an invitation to try my own hand at land-scape painting.

Growing up in Vancouver in the early 80s with only a dozen TV channels to choose from, it wasn't long before I discovered KTCS 9 public television, with its quirky shows, documentaries, and best of all, no commercials. Years earlier in grade five we had artist Daniel Izzard come visit our class. Within an hour I watched in amazement as he created a world right before my eyes. This was the first time I remember seeing an artist in action, and it's made an impression. I don't recall exactly when I first encountered Bob Ross' The Joy of Painting, but it would have been by accident as I idly flipped through the dials waiting for something to come on.

Bob Ross was a magician, one who could pull a landscape out of thin air. I was immediately seduced by the ease with which he could articulate a landscape that was nowhere in particular yet totally familiar at the same time. In the solitude of our basement I even tried to paint along, cobbling together whatever craft paints we had lying around to little effect or success. As I grew into my teens, my interests changed, and as the years passed my memories of Bob Ross faded and morphed from a magician to a pop culture icon and purveyor of kitsch. While serving as a tribute to the artistic legacy of an artist whose name and work is as well known, this

exhibition looks to explore the deeper questions



around nostalgia, high and low art, art history, the cult of celebrity, pop culture, the art market and ultimately what is worthy of being exhibited and preserved in our museums. Bob and I both agree there are no wrong answers and I am fascinated to explore these questions.

We owe a great deal of thanks to Sarah Strohl and the team at Bob Ross Inc., and Elizabeth Bracey of the Visual Arts Center in Loudoun County, Virginia, which hosted the first gallery-curated exhibition of Bob Ross paintings.

CLIFFORD MILLER CONNOR KENNEY DR. MERLIN SELLER

July 4 to September 13, 2020 / Project Room Gallery

This exhibition explores and challenges our notion of landscape painting by asking: is this the future of landscape painting as we know it? A number of years ago while talking with artist **Connor Kenney**, he revealed that he was engaging in plein air painting while gaming, taking time to document the landscapes in the video games he was playing. I was fascinated by this on so many levels as it seemed to me, for Connor, that there was little or no separation between the real landscape outside his home and the ones depicted in the virtual world.

En plein air is a French expression meaning "in the open air," and has up to this point referred to the act of painting outdoors with the artist's subject in full view. In doing so, artists are able to capture the spirit, essence, and subtle nuances of the landscape or subject as it is a dynamic environment, constantly moving and changing with light and environmental conditions.

Later that summer Connor was participating in an intensive artist in residency program where he set up his gaming system, and over the residency he continued down this path. Was this merely an addiction to gaming or was there something more? Over the subsequent years I have wanted to explore this idea, and had looked for the appropriate opportunity to develop an exhibition around the subject. This past year I started to explore the virtual landscape myself. The first thing I stumbled upon was **Clifford**

Kamppari-Miller's website en Game Air. It took a great deal of sleuthing to track down and contact Clifford in Portland, as I was fascinated by his approach and the way he documented his thoughts and process. Not being a gamer myself, I was given a window into this world and wanted to know more and kept searching the internet for others, when I came across **Dr. Merlin Seller** in Scotland.

I reached out to Dr. Seller, currently working at the University of Edinburgh, and I was thrilled not only to receive a reply but to read what they wrote: "Thank you for getting in touch — this sounds like a fascinating (and timely) exhibition. With the recent widespread adoption of in-engine 'photo-modes' in many open-world games, there is a definite interest in the aesthetics of digital land-scapes and scope for significant critical trans-media painting practices..."

And so it came to pass! Over the course of the exhibition, the games they have drawn their inspiration from will be on display for the public to try their hand at. Connor and Clifford will both be in Penticton to talk about their work and to host a workshop.

THE HISTORY OF SPEED PAINTING IN CANADA



Long before I had ever considered doing an exhibition of Bob Ross I had been fascinated by the work of **Levine Flexhaug** (1918 – 1974), whose works I would find from time to time at thrift stores. I would purchase them as they were somewhat beguiling, something that I couldn't quite place into the land-scape of our art history. At the beginning I had a \$5 limit as to what I would pay for them and I would then turn around and sell them on eBay, typically between \$19.99 and \$29.99, always to an address in Toronto. This was in the early 2000s while I was living in Grand Forks, and after the 3rd or 4th one I sold I decided it might be worth following the trail and digging a little deeper.

It turned out that my paintings were being purchased by a folk art dealer and in doing some online research I was amazed to discover that an art student in Toronto had done an installation using Flexhaug's work in a thrift store, and another had used his works as the inspiration for a huge installation on the prairies. Years later while visiting my friend and artist George Shawchuk in Fanny Bay, he handed me a copy of a catalogue for an exhibition he was in at the McMichael Gallery, and wouldn't you know it, there was Flexhaug. This all further fueled my interest and I continued my hunt for his paintings and would spend more and more time trying to unravel the mystery of who this artist was.

While this exhibition will give you an insight into the life and work of Levine Flexhaug, it's really intended to give you an introduction and a sense of the tradition of speed painting in Canada. For Levine, most of these paintings were done in the late 1940s, before Bob Ross was even born, and sold at the train stations in Banff and Lake Louise.

In addition to the work of Levine Flexhaug we will also feature the work of **Joe Prokopchuk** (aka Yukon Joe) (1905 - 2000) who sold his work from Prince George to the Yukon. Two years ago while visiting Ft. Nelson I was amazed to see the local museum was filled with his work. In doing more re-



search into his life I found out that Yukon Joe's Diary is one of the 100 Objects of Interest on the Royal B.C. Museum website.

We will also display a number of paintings for your consideration by the renowned artist **Toni Onley** (1929-2004). Toni was well known for being able to paint one of his watercolours in 20 minutes and when asked how he could charge \$2,500 for them he would quip, "it may be 20 minutes now, but its a lifetime of learning."



TOURING EXHIBITIONSBehind the Lines: Contemporary Syrian Art

It's incredible to think back to 2016 and the opening of this exhibition, which featured 100 works by 19 contemporary Syrian artists, 13 of which at that time were still living in Syria, including the co-curator, **Humam Alsalim**. Over the past 4 years, this exhibition has gone on a remarkable tour across B.C., the Yukon, and Alberta stopping at 14 venues and having been seen by over **70,000 visitors**. Two venues are scheduled in 2020, with possible stops in Ontario.

Over the past years, all but six of the artists have been able to leave Syria, including Humam, who is now living in Berlin where he works with SYRIA.ART. This organization aims to promote Contemporary Syrian Art, as well as Syrian culture, literature, and music, to Western audiences. For more information please check out their website at en.syriaartasso.com.

This past October I was afforded a once in a lifetime opportunity to travel to Finland to attend the WOM-EX (World Music Expo) conference, which also happened to coincide with my 50th birthday. Knowing that I may not get the opportunity again, we took an extra week to visit Berlin and meet Humam Alsalim for the first time. Even more amazing, Humam put us up in his apartment for the entire length of our stay and a local film student documented our meeting and our conversation reflecting back on this exhibition from the start.

The benefit of this exhibition to the Penticton Art Gallery has been unbelievable and has helped us to make a mark here in Canada. It proves just what is possible when one takes a chance. This exhibition has also generated revenue for the Gallery and touched the lives of so many people in Canada, Syria, and across Europe.

Humam Alsalim has worked tirelessly and at great personal risk, especially when we first started collecting, packing, and shipping the exhibition from Damascus. He undertook this project with no expectation of remuneration, but rather out of a commitment to promote, preserve, and document the artistic and cultural heritage of Syria and that of his friends and colleagues.

When I met Humam in person, I wanted to bring him a unique and quintessentially British Columbian gift as a token of appreciation for all the work he has done for this exhibition. Thinking of a suitable gift, I kept coming back to the classic Cowichan Sweater, famous the world over, and something that would not only be a practical gift for Berlin but would last Humam a lifetime. I sought out options and Robert MacLean, one of our first hosts and promoters of the exhibition on Vancouver Island, stepped up and helped me to acquire a beautiful vintage Cowichan sweater

This is certainly not the end of the line of our friendship and our partnership. This exhibition continues to be relevant: it draws interest from galleries across Canada and we hope that it will continue to tour for some time yet. We look forward to developing new projects and continuing to build bridges of understanding and connection.





In At Eternity's Gate, a vivid portrait of Vincent van Gogh toward the end of his life, the artist walks and walks. Often dressed in a blue shirt, he carries an easel, brushes, and paint strapped to his back. One day in 1888, he puts his battered boots on the red tile floor of his room in Arles, France. He quickly begins creating a simple painting of them; the original now hangs in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

The journey of those shoes from humble floor to museum wall tells a familiar story about van Gogh, whose painful life is part of a brand known as Vincent the Mad Genius. This film imagines a different Vincent. This Vincent is not defined by that brand but by the art with which he at once communes with the world and transcends it.



Submission Information:

Submission of physical works are to be no larger than $11'' \times 14''$. All 2D works will be matted and stored in crystal clear bags. 3D works will be dealt with on an individual basis. Video and audio are also welcome.

All submitted works will be included in an exhibition at the Penticton Art Gallery in the fall. They will also be featured permanently online.

Due to the nature of the exhibition, the works will not be returned. They will be kept as an archive, documenting this moment in our cultural history, by the Penticton Art Gallery. The collection will be made available for loan to other galleries and museums across the globe.



CALL FOR GUEST CURATORS

The Penticton Art Gallery is seeking up to four individuals to participate as Guest Curators for an upcoming exhibition exploring diversity in the arts in our community. The exhibition will take place at the Penticton Art Gallery, opening on Saturday, March 27, 2021 and will continue through Sunday, May 16, 2021.

With the aim of encouraging new emerging voices in our community, this open Call for Guest Curators, will provide 1-4 deserving individuals the unique opportunity to act as curator, or as a curatorial team, to design, develop, and realize an innovative exhibition and community engagement program to celebrate diversity in our arts community.

Starting this fall 2020, the selected guest curators will work with the Penticton Art Gallery's Curator, Collections Manager, and Education Coordinator to develop an exhibition exploring their own histories and experience, focussing on diversity in the arts. In our terms, diversity refers to a wide spectrum of people of colour, people with disabilities, age, gender, and other classifications. Qualified candidates with diverse backgrounds and/or studies are strongly encouraged to apply for this unique community engagement opportunity.

The selected curator(s) will receive valuable mentor support from the Gallery staff, including: installation guidance in preparation for the exhibition; research; artist relations; writing texts for didactics, blogs, social media, website, and the Gallery's Arts Letter publication; exhibition development; installation; development of public programs, including artist talks and gallery tours.

In exchange, the guest curator(s) will be awarded an honorarium and will develop a budget to pay participating artists, program speakers, host an exhibition opening, shipping of artwork, and public programming (including fundraising and sponsorship opportunities).

Proposals will be accepted up to September 30, 2020 and will be evaluated on the merit of each applicant's proposed project.



NEWS FROM THE VAULT

Greetings from the Vault!

Despite being closed to the public for a few months, collections work continued behind-the-scenes. We thought that the closure would be the perfect time to complete some much-needed maintenance in the Vault.

No exhibitions meant that the Main Gallery was empty, for the first time in decades. This was perfect for our maintenance project! Paul and I, piece by piece, emptied the entire Vault into the Main Gallery. This was the first time that either of us have had the opportunity to see every work in the Permanent Collection. We noted which pieces required some conservation and re-framing, and put those ones aside.

With the Vault empty (!!) it was time to get to work. We hired some fabulous contractors, Dan and Kristine, to work with us. We sourced new 12ft metal racking for our small-medium 2D pieces, and divided each section with lengths of PVC pipe. Dan got busy building 9ft shelving for our large 2D pieces and complicated 3D pieces.

Our framing room also received a makeover during the closure. Dan installed some wrap-around frame storage as well as shelving to hold our ever-growing box collection of exhibition files. All of our flat plan chests, holding unframed works on paper, were moved into the framing room with Tetris-like skill. We even had room to create a photography and documentation station for me!

Now the fun part begins — refilling the Vault. The

game plan is to keep works by the same artist of similar size together. We'll see how well this works in reality. I'm so thrilled that we were able to start and complete this huge project during our closure.

I owe a huge amount of gratitude to Dan, Kristine, and Scott, our fabulous contractors and framing enthusiasts, for making all of my wild ideas come true. When you see them, show some love and give them as many socially-distanced elbow-fives as they can handle!

Now is the time to vacuum up the sawdust, reset the humidity controls, and get organized! I look forward to seeing all of you at the Bob Ross: Happy Little Accidents exhibition opening on July 4th. If you are also undertaking a huge renovation, remember, in the wise words of Bob Ross: there are no mistakes, just happy little accidents.






