## MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR/CURATOR



I hope this finds you and yours healthy and comforted by the warming of days and the reawakening of the landscape surrounding us. As the pandemic continues to ebb and flow, it is hard to fully comprehend all that has changed over the past fourteen months, and our memories of a past we once knew slowly fade away.

Our whole world has been turned upside down and the increasing sense of isolation we are facing is only further amplified by the illusion that we are enjoying a deeper level of connectivity brought on by our increased use of, and reliance on, technology. If things were not complicated enough, the rise of social media has for many replaced traditional media. The emergence of fake news has created a post-truth world. Science-based evidence has become less influential in shaping public opinion in favour of appeals based on emotion and fed by alternative facts, conjecture, and one's personal beliefs.

I am aware of the fragile and tenuous nature of this moment in history, and I often wonder if we are on the cusp of our own Dark Age as experienced throughout Western Europe with the decline of the Roman Empire. The parallels are quite interesting as it all started with the sudden power vacuum and the collapse of the economic system, exacerbated by climate change which resulted in increased famine, and was topped off by the bubonic plague. Europe would ultimately lose 20 million people to the plague, over a third of the living population at the time, prompting the survivors to place their faith for a cure in their religious belief, folklore, and superstition, rather than medical knowledge based in science.

Conversely, I also see the potential that we are on the cusp of an incredible cultural Renaissance, not unlike the Arts and Crafts movement inspired by John Ruskin and William Morris at the end of the 19th century in England. The core characteristics of the Arts and Crafts movement were a belief in craftsmanship which stresses the inherent beauty of the material, the importance of nature as inspiration, and the value of simplicity, utility, and beauty. The movement was born out of the anxieties resulting from the rapid industrialization of society serving as a positive revaluation of handcraftsmanship and precapitalist forms of culture and society, which they believed had been debased by mechanization. The proponents also advocated for social reform as part of its philosophy and instigated a critique of industrial labor; as modern machines replaced workers, Arts and Crafts proponents called for an end to the division of labor and advanced the designer as craftsman.

We have the incredible opportunity to redefine our community by creating affordable spaces for artists to live, work, create, collaborate, perform, exhibit, display, and animate our public spaces in a rich and meaningful way. It is not a far reaching dream, and anyone who has traveled has experienced the value arts and culture bring to the vitality, livability, and by

extension the economic well-being of a community. What is needed is for us to collectively make the commitment to providing artists with the space to live, create, and share their creative practice and the rest will take care of itself. I was driving through Princeton recently and I noticed that they are now proclaiming themselves as the Bronze Sculpture Capital of Canada. A lofty claim indeed, and one I thought would have been backed up with an impressive display of sculpture lining the green space along the road. Amazingly, the only sculpture I could see was a bird perched on top of a wooden archway at the entrance to their main street into town. What it reinforced was the power of suggestion. While it may be a far-reaching claim to make today, it may ultimately manifest itself into reality, or at least until they are challenged to substantiate their claim on the title. With this in mind, why don't we make our own claim on being British Columbia's cultural capital and provide incentives to attract artists and those working in the creative economy?

Not to undermine the magnitude of the pandemic, but in some ways we have been given this gift of time to rethink, rebrand, and recreate our community into something that is not only uniquely ours, but also draws upon experiences and success enjoyed by other communities around the globe. I would love to see the City commit wholly to including the Penticton Indian Band as an equal partner in the development of a long term cultural plan, providing space at the table for the band to lead the community through a plan that best celebrates and recognizes the incredible culture of the Okanagan Nation and land on which we gather.

With that in mind, the City of Penticton is currently seeking your input for the revisioning and potential redevelopment of the City's Northern Gateway. The City sees that this project could provide some unique opportunities for the integration of arts and culture. The first phase of engagement will take place online from April 21st to May 19th. I would also like to thank all those who have supported the Penticton Art Gallery through these challenging times. I ask that you please consider the purchase of a Gallery membership. This is your opportunity to learn more about the Gallery, ask questions, provide feedback, celebrate our successes, and elect our new Board of Directors. In closing, I would like to acknowledge the passing of a great friend and supporter of the Gallery, Frans Wynans (March 20, 1945 - April 5, 2021). Frans will be best remembered as being one of Vancouver's most flamboyant and larger-than-life art dealers, one whose enthusiasm and passion for the art of the deal brought him as much fame as it did notoriety. Over the course of his career he became a fixture in the international art market through his collaborations with some of the 20th century's most renowned artists including Andy Warhol, Philip Pearlstein, and Sir Peter Blake. A complex and polarizing figure in the art world. I will cherish the time we spent together and only wish I had taken the time to document his story. He was a legend in every sense of the word, and I have no doubt that Frans Wynans' legacy will be felt well into the future.

# DALE MATTHEWS: FROM THEN TILL NOW Main Gallery

May 22, 2021 to June 19, 2021

I have always considered and understood art history to be a visual diary of our collective social history, as each artist and the work they produce has a direct correlation to the environment in which they lived, those they associated with, and their world view. It is also interesting, and not surprising, the impact a single teacher well-placed in your development can have on the course of your life and the lives of so many liked minded individuals.

Growing up in the small town of Rossland, it is incredible to think that within a few years of each other the town would produce an incredible number of artists and arts professionals including Dale Matthews, Alf Crossley, Wayne Eastcott, John Stark, and even our own Gail Cornish. Interestingly, the dynamic our society has set up between the arts and sport, one which was beautifully illustrated through a visit to Rossland's Wikipedia page. Under the heading of notable people, ten individuals are listed: eight are athletes, one is the former Canadian Prime Minister John Turner, and the only artist is actor John Stark. I would be willing to wager that the legacies of the unnamed artists have a greater potential to continue to impact and inspire countless generations well into the future.

With that in mind, it is always a pleasure to be afforded the privilege to explore the totality of an artist's career. Within each work one can find the double helix which makes up the duality of Dale's personal and professional practice. While this exhibition is not quite a retrospective, it does serve as a pictorial essay providing the roadmap to the work of an artist whose legacy has inadvertently intersected with the lives of generations of British Columbians.

The story begins with a young student at the Vancouver School of Art in the late 1950s and follows his career as a sign painter, a designer of architectural interiors for retail stores, shopping malls, cruise ships, and our own fleet of BC Ferries, culminating with the paintings he is best known for today. If you have ever lived or spent any time in the lower mainland over the past 60 years, you have most likely been impacted in some regard by Dale's commercial work. More recently if you have attended any group exhibitions here in the Okanagan over the years, you have most certainly communed with his paintings.

This exhibition hopes to highlight the breadth of the journey travelled, illustrating the totality of a lifetime's pursuit and commitment to a singular passion for self expression and creativity. I would like to thank Dale for his trust and willingness to share his story. I hope you enjoy discovering the arc of his career as much as I have. Dale Matthews lives and works out of his studio overlooking Trout Creek.

## Diane DeRoo + Jean Sanford

Diane DeRoo is a botanical artist who has developed her own unique style. Utilizing the vegetables, herbs, and flowers cultivated from her garden, she creates a collection of show-stopping wall hangings. Throughout her 30 years of practice, Diane has developed a range of drying, pressing, and casting techniques for capturing the beauty of her homegrown plants in her art.

Diane's pressed work uses delicate cross sections of her subject. She creates these paper-thin slices by using a razor to cut through the centre of the vegetable, preserving the roots, stems, and seeds. Diane has spent years developing her skills and creating a unique process where she is able to press and dry these perfect cross-sections to use in her art. Diane's finished works capture the vivid colours, varied textures, and delicate inner details of each vegetable.

All of Diane's work is inspired by her love of nurturing plants in her backyard oasis, her ever-growing interest in art and botany, as well as the calming and meditative place that is her cottage garden. Diane as an artisan aims to draw the viewer in and surprise them as they look more closely into the intricate beauty of each piece.



## **DAY 103 / KIM DORLAND (b. 1974)**

Dorland was born in Wainwright, Alberta and grew up in Red Deer, Alberta. He received his B.F.A from Emily Carr Institute of Art and Design in 1998 and completed his Master's of Fine Art at York University in 2003. He currently lives in Toronto, Ontario and is best known for his thickly painted, fluorescent imbued landscapes, super-thick portraiture, and his use of multiple painting mediums per canvas.

In 2017, Equinox Gallery in Vancouver featured the artist's newest paintings in a solo show, "Nemophilia," and he has shown widely throughout Canada and the United States. The artist's works are in the collections of the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego, the Montréal Museum of Fine Arts, and the Glenbow Museum in Calgary, among others.

Dorland first gained attention with his paintings of suburbia which drew heavily on nostalgia from his days as a teen growing up in Red Deer, Alberta, Canada. These paintings of bush parties, fist fights and wooded areas on the edges of suburbia were characterized by fluorescent under paintings and thick passages of impasto.

Dorland became known for the thickness of his paint, particularly in his dense portraits (primarily of his wife, Lori) where the paint is piled on so thick in places that he often had to use screws to secure it. He is also known for using multiple materials (traditional and non-traditional) on one surface, including oil paint, acrylic paint, spray paint, ink, phosphorescence, inkjet printing, screws, fur, and paper.

Dorland has cited Canada's Group of Seven and, specifically, Tom Thomson as early influences. After his suburban paintings, his next body of work focused primarily on landscapes, bringing the tradition of Canadian landscape painting, popularized by the Group of Seven, into a contemporary context. Dorland's landscapes from this time depict forests with traces of human contact including graffiti and litter.

Dorland exhibited his work in the McMichael Canadian Art Collection, alongside paintings by artists from the Group of Seven. That same year, in 2013, he was named The Globe and Mail's Artist of the Year.

## A New Public Art Project in Partnership with Cannery Brewing

In January, a call went out to artists interested in participating and nearly 80 applications were received. A jury reviewed the applications and have now completed the artist selection. Eight local artists have been selected to create 4' x 4' mini murals.

Once the murals are completed in March 2021, there will be a series of unveilings at Cannery Brewing. In the summer, the murals will be moved outside to Cannery Brewing's Backyard. At the end of the program, the murals will be auctioned off to the public in the fall.

Ian Dyck, co-owner of Cannery Brewing explained, "We are thrilled with the strong and diverse group of artists that have been selected to participate in this project. They all have distinct styles, and we can't wait to see what they create for display at our brewery."

Paul Crawford, Curator at the Penticton Art Gallery said, "Taking inspiration from the ArtsWells Festival's wildly successful Mini Mural Project, we are thrilled to bring a similar program to our community." The original project was started in 2009 by the Wells, BC artist Caroline Anders as part of their annual festival. Once completed, the murals would be displayed at the Island Mountain Arts Art Gallery and then auctioned off. In the subsequent years, the town has become an outdoor art gallery with dozens of homes and businesses sporting one or more of the paintings for everyone to enjoy.

Crawford continued, "We are so excited about this project, and I hope this is something we can continue in years to come. There was an overwhelming number of applications received, so thank you to our great local artists. We would love to fill the town with as many murals as we can! Thank you to Cannery Brewing for partnering with us on this. They have always been huge supporters of the Gallery, and we can't wait to see this project come to light."
