

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A Collective Voice:

Following the thread of collaborative experience through electronics, sensors, voice and felt

At the Penticton Museum

Tuesday March 15th 12:00 pm to 1:00 pm Admission: Free



In this talk, three artists will present their work and speak about their process in collaborating on two intersecting art pieces: "Vocal Improvisation and Motion-Activated Electroacoustic Sound Interaction (VIMES)", and "Migration Parade: Holon".

These projects bring the mediums of felt, sound, sensor technology, movement, and voice together to explore the collective within the individual and the individual within the collective, as well as the relationship between human and artificial voices.

The artists will describe their journey, as well as talk about their upcoming exhibition which will be held at the Penticton Art Gallery as part of the Ignite the Arts Festival in March 2022.

DANIELLE SAVAGE works with electroacoustic and acoustic music & sound. She is interested in creating participatory experiences in which one can experience sound as speculation, practice, communication, research, ritual. She has had works performed and presented at: San Francisco Tape Music Festival, Festival la Mansión de la Cantante Muda, Mixtape #IWA, Festival Muchas Músicas, Foro De Música Nueva, Visiones Sonoras, 60x60 festival, Montreal/ New Musics, Festival Días Diseño, ArtsWells Festival, Lux Magna Festival, Kulaks Woodshed Hollywood, and more.

MIA HARRIS is a multi-disciplinary artist who works with voice, movement, performance art, theater, film, and most recently painting and sculpting. Her curiosity lies in witnessing the present moment and expressing her reality, her version of the human condition, by following impulses that arise. She created, performed and toured a solo performance piece entitled "Biography of a Voice". Other highlights include 'Drawl Project' exploring Okanagan accents, 'White Wines' for the Radio Free Stein project, Opera Excerpts for the Vancouver New Music 40th Anniversary Retrospective and a Leonard Cohen Tribute concert with internationally known poet, Shane Koyzan. Mia has recently completed an Artist Residency at the Penticton Art Gallery.

ALEXANDRA GOODALL is a multidisciplinary artist from the Okanagan Valley, British Columbia. In her studio practice, her passion lies in sculptural textile and installation. In her facilitation work and individual sessions, she aims to bridge the disciplines of art, psychology and bodily presence. She holds a Masters Degree in Intermodal Arts from the European Graduate School in Switzerland. Her undergraduate work was in Costume Studies at Dalhousie University.

MIGRATION PARADE: HOLON



Migration Parade: Holon is an interactive, collaborative sound and sculptural work that will be exhibited at the PAG from March 26—May 15, 2022. It involves a main installation, created by Danielle Savage and Alexandra Goodall, and 3 other related projects which have emerged in response to this work. In the lead-up to this exhibition, artists from the 4 intersecting works will be hosted in the main gallery in an open studio residency format, giving the public an opportunity to get a sneak-peak into their creative process as their works evolve.

From February 20th - 26th, Charlie Prince will be conducting a residency in preparation for a durational performance that will take place in the completed Migration Parade: Holon exhibition. Charlie will be using this time to conduct choreographic and somatic research with a 6 person movement ensemble (Gita Harris, Maiya Robbie, Jess Glavina, Nikos Theodosakis, Peter Kok, Julie Fowler). Visitors are invited to witness this research in action on February 24th when the main gallery will be open to the public.

The ensemble will then return to the gallery space from March 27-April 3rd to create the final movement piece. Visitors are encouraged to come down and take in both the sculptural exhibition and the durational performance piece as it is created in real-time. You can interact with the sculptures yourself, or watch as the ensemble moves, discusses, and performs their work in a transparent-to-the-public, research-creation process. Alexandra Goodall and Danielle Savage will be in the studio from March 7th onwards. Gallery visitors will be welcome to join them and watch their process on Thursday, March 10th and Thursday, March 17 from 1-5 pm. They invite you to observe their working process, share impressions, ask questions, or just take in the space as the exhibition is installed.



Ari Neufeld will be joining our featured exhibits during the time of the Ignite the Arts Festival in the Toni Onley Gallery. Ari is a second generation British Columbian, raised by missionary parents.

His dad, usually deprived of sleep, had a pun or quip for every situation. Most of them were very personal and obscure to only him, and he would none-the-less, be compelled to loudly eject his observations in every social setting. As a child Ari remembers wondering if those outbursts were his dad's deeply rye sense of humor (he seemed amused at how uncomfortable it made Ari), or if indeed those "jokes" were merely for his own entertainment.

"I AM COMPELLED TO SAY SILLY THINGS."



Ari's best friend was visiting for dinner one evening and he innocently said he would need to find the nearest bus stop after dinner so he could get home. Neufeld's Father retorted, "Hit me with your Bus Stop, baby!" something Ari's dad had always said whenever "bus stop" was mentioned. This never phased Ari or his brothers as funny. Ari's buddy LOST his mind in laughter. He claimed it was the funniest thing he'd EVER heard.

As soon as Ari had kids and pets of his own, he immediately had concerned friends and family asking why he was saying such weird and silly stuff all of the time. Ari says on his habit, "Truth is, I can't help it. I am compelled to say silly things. But I did evolve from my Dad in this: I decided to try and create a visual concept of what I thought was 'punny' or ridiculous. And then I became a little bit obsessed with it."

Ari's father passed away nearly a decade ago now, but he thinks about him every time this bizarre, tongue-in-cheek sense of humor creeps into his psyche. About one of his pieces, Ari says "My most unorthodox piece: the bar stool in full-gate sprint saying 'RUNNY STOOL!' came to me while at my Dad's five year memorial site celebration on Anvil Island."

Humor is a strange source of light that can heal some of our deepest wounds. It's often funniest when it shouldn't really be, when you're buckled over with laughter and you're not entirely sure why. Ari believes in that. His dad believed in that.

Ari continues, "This series is based predominantly on the idea of animals on our British Columbian West Coast, if they could talk. And they were created just in case someone should need a little shaft of light along their path. And I dedicate it to my Dad, born Donald Corny (true story) Neufeld."

"I know it's silly..." will run its exhibit from March 26—May 15, 2022.

Self-Preservation DANIELLE KRYSA

Broken can be beautiful, trash can be treasure, and a bit of cheeky humor can always be found — you just have to keep your eyes open.

Danielle Krysa joins the Penticton Art Gallery for her exhibit "Self Preservation" in the Project Gallery, running from March 26—May 15, 2022.

Danielle Krysa is a Canadian artist with a BFA in Visual Arts and a post-grad degree in design. Her combination of found imagery and found objects work together to create a brand new story. Her work is held in private collections in Canada, Australia, The United States and Europe. Danielle is also the writer behind the contemporary art site, The Jealous Curator, and the author of "Creative Block", "Your Inner Critic Is A Big Jerk", "A Big Important Art Book – Now With Women", and her first children's book, "How To Spot an Artist".

Danielle Krysa continues to live, work, blog and curate the OK MoMA gallery from her home in Summerland, British Columbia.



"Self-Preservation" will feature a combination of sculptures and collages representing a health battle Danielle went through in June of 2020.

"I woke up in the hospital with a ten inch incision across my belly. I'd never felt this empty — both physically and emotionally. Doctors have been removing ugly lumps and growths from my abdomen for years, but this time they took everything." Krysa recalls about her time in ill-health. "While my uterus was no longer part of me, I was so grateful this malfunctioning organ worked long enough for me to become a mother. That said, I was now overcome with a huge sense of loss."

Instead of wallowing in this, Krysa chose to reimagine the bits and pieces of "medical waste" they'd taken from her body as beautiful, feminine objects that she could gather and preserve — as a way to take some power back, and to preserve her state of mind. The result: Specimen jars filled with everything from broken jewelry and fake flowers, to shattered ceramics and clay cigarettes. Broken but beautiful, treasures instead of trash.

Speaking to her collages titled "From the Ashes" Krysa says, "These collages on panel are a continuation from the 'Self-Preservation' sculptures, but they cast a wider net. While the specimen jars focus on my personal health, the collages are about not only myself, but so many other women who have overcome difficulties, started over, pulled themselves out of the dark, and risen from the ashes to begin again. Loss, grief, and abuse can try to hold us down, but women are TOUGH. We will always, always push through the muck, and continue to bloom."

The Following is written by Paul Crawford, Director/ Curator and creator of Ignite the Arts Festival.

Over the past 20 years I have been involved in attending and building festivals. I have always been amazed by the incredible collective goodwill and sense of community one experiences when they enter the festival grounds and the incredible power of the wrist band has to break down barriers giving you licence and the a newfound super power to meaningfully engage and connect with others in a way you would never do outside the confines of the event. There isn't a person alive on this planet whose life hasn't been shaped and defined by a soundtrack, one that documents all of the emotions we have experience in our lives, and has the power to lift up to the greatest of heights and bring us to our knees.

I have witnesses time and time again how the collective shared experiences of a festival can build, enrich and strengthen our sense of community. The festival provides an escape, a place where one can be carefree without inhibitions, experiencing the out

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of the ordinary, and forgetting the everyday world. Festivals provide opportunities establish of social networks, which can contribute to the enhancement of community cohesion and the building of social capital within a community. While music may be the hook and the conduit, I have also come to appreciate that it's value truly lies in the social interactions that occur away from the stages as its through these magical moments where we establish those lasting memories which extend beyond the entertainment that not only shared with those whom you experienced it, but also with our wider social circles.

The idea of this festival has been percolating for the better part of the past 15 years and after two years of isolation, the timing couldn't' be better to launch an event that has the power to bring us all together to rebuild our community through a collective shared experience. In developing the idea we drew upon over 20 years of experience putting on an hosting events including the Festival of Freedom at the Forks, The ArtsWells Festival and our first attempt at a festival here in Penticton, Folkanagan. In each case we have taken the elements we felt worked best to create an event which is uniquely ours. Ultimately the success will be the sum of the parts and we see this as Penticton's event. As they say "a rising tide floats all boats." We now find ourselves at a unique place in our history, one where we are able to wipe the slate clean and set an intention to rebuild our sense of community and re-envisioning a city that is based on the ideals, amenities and values that are important to us. We believe in the power of art and culture to not only enhance the places where we live and work but also the lives of all of those who visit and are fortunate to call it home.


We are committed to having the Ignite the Arts Festival become a major annual celebration of art and culture, to a much needed economic boost to help galvanize, build and strengthen our community. 
