

I can't believe how incredibly lucky I am to have been afforded the opportunity to meet so many inspired individuals, many of whom I have had the great fortune to learn from and collaborate with along the way. Through good fortune, I have been given a number of platforms by which I am able to share, celebrate and honour their creativity, art and life stories with a much larger audience. Along the way I have learned the value and rewards that come when one is open to any and all possibilities... anything, anywhere.

Our summer's exhibitions are a perfect example of how an idea can percolate for years before presenting itself in the most unexpected of ways and seemingly unlikeliest of circumstances. This past Christmas my wife and I traveled to Mexico to visit my sisters and in planning our vacation, they suggested that we might like the City of Oaxaca for it's food and culture. What we were not prepared for was the incredible street art we discovered throughout the city. The more we saw the more we started seeking it out, along with the studios and artists who were creating these powerful images. This suddenly became the focus of our trip. As we discovered more and more studios and met the artists, I wanted to share this experience with our community! I hope this inspires the artists I know to see that there is so much more potential and power in the work they do.



The story of street art and the print making renascence in Oaxaca is a truly inspiring story, one born out of the social unrest and the government crackdowns in 2006. Since then, they have seen a handful of studios explode into over 60 ateliers and collectives in the 16 years since. While many of these artists and groups have faced constant censorship and erasure, their popularity has continued to rise attracting more and more international attention, including invitations to show their work in galleries and museums across the globe. To quote from the manifesto of the Subterráneos Collective, "We exist, because we resist. For the oppressed, for the invisible, for those who wanted to bury the underground, we exist."

I am excited to share with our community the work of two of Oaxaca's print collectives Subterráneos and Taller Artístico Comunitario (TAC) - and I hope that their work will have the same impact it had on me for all of those who come into contact with it this summer. In addition to their work in the Gallery we are thrilled to have been able to bring Eloisa Guerrero André Martinez from and Subterráneos to help install the exhibitions and provide printmaking workshops to over 50 local artists and individuals. We are also excited to take a number of these works outside of the gallery and into the community to give a sense of the vitality that street art can bring to a community, and the power it has to create public discourse and social change. This exhibition was made possible through the support of the BC Arts Council and the Province of British Columbia through the awarding of an Arts Impact Grant.

I wish you all the very best life has to offer this summer and I hope you will find inspiration, comfort and a much needed escape in one of the countless cultural events and offerings that are available on a daily basis, not only in our community, but throughout the province and beyond. I hope that our summers exhibitions will inspire all those who walk through our doors, past our building and encounter these works throughout the city.

Either way, I am happy to be here, and I have so many things I am excited to do in my position as Communications Coordinator.

I think a lot of life (and art) is experimentation until you figure out what works. I hope you will join me on this new era of the Gallery, as I experiment with new ideas for this arts letter, the exhibitions, the branding, the marketing, and the gallery space itself. ART AND ACTIVISM: CONTEMPORARY PRINTMAKING FROM OAXACA, MEXICO

This exhibition is focused on the incredible work done by two of the leading artist collectives from Oaxaca, Mexico comprised of young art students and street artists. They employ multiple mediums including wood and linoleum block prints, large-scale graffiti murals, interventionist stencils, and wheat pastes.

Both collectives owe their roots to the Asamblea de Artistas Revolucionarios de Oaxaca (ASARO) which was formed in 2006. ASARO was part of a broader social movement, part of which advocated for higher teachers' salaries and access to school supplies. They exercise their collective voices through artistic interventions taking their art to the streets and public spaces. They believe in collective social action utilizing modern conventions in graffiti, printmaking, and contemporary communication through social networking. From these beginnings Colectivo Subterráneo and Taller Artístico Comunitario have firmly established their own place in Oaxaca's rich cultural history attracting international attention as well as state-sanctioned support for their artists' workshops while also using their notoriety to teach Oaxacan youth the importance of publicly expressing and exhibiting their perspectives on the visual landscape. •

Community Artistic Workshop (TAC) which is the physical space from where they work collaboratively giving workshops, talks and other artistic activities under the pretext of a social struggle. By obtaining a permanent workshop, the collective has produced different graphic projects in large format to be taken to the streets of the city of Oaxaca mainly because of the political situation in that state, given that it is a highly politicized territory where there is a great deal of inequality of opportunity and social backwardness in general, a state that is being deprived of it's natural resources, their traditions, clothing and culture in general.

Laurence Evelyn Hyde (1914 - 1987)

"Words are capable of expressing very complicated and very subtle notions ... But for directness and universal interpretation, pictures, under certain conditions, are unrivalled. It really depends on what you want to say." Laurence Hyde, Afterword to Southern Cross

Southern Cross: A Novel of the South Seas, is a stunning wordless novel told in 118 wood engravings by the Canadian artist Laurence Hyde in protest to the tests of the hydrogen bomb made by the United States at the Bikini Atoll in 1946. The inspiration behind book was clearly political, and the book has been called "a political marker of the Cold War years". The high-contrast artwork of Southern Cross features dynamic curving lines uncommon in wood engraving and combines abstract imagery with realistic detail. Laurence took three years to hand carve the 118 wood engravings and in 1951 the entire collection were hand printed from the original wood blocks and published as a small limited edition by the Ward Ritchie Press in Los Angeles. Hyde dedicated the book to the Red Cross Societies and the Society of Friends. The book has since been republished twice—in 2007 Drawn & Quarterly released a deluxe facsimile edition with additional essays by Hyde and an introduction by wordless novel historian David Beronä, and George Walker included Southern Cross in his anthology of wordless novels Graphic Witness in 2014.

LASTING IMPRESSIONS

WRITTEN BY **PAUL CRAWFORD** Albrecht Dürer (1471-1528), Rembrandt Harmenszoon van Rijn (1606-1669), and William Hogarth (1697-1764)

Using the works of three of histories best known printmakers this exhibition explores how the art of printmaking became one of the most democratic disciplines of art by allowing more accessible to the general public. The rise of printmaking helped push the visual arts out into the public arena beyond the realm of the elite patrons and the church which had traditionally supported and commissioned the arts for their enjoyment and political will. Etching was first popularized in the 15th century tracing its origins to the armorer's trade, where it was used to add elaborate patterns to swords and armor, which was later adopted to massproduce images on paper.

Despite living 500 years ago, Albrecht Durer remains one of the most famous and important printmakers in western art history, a reputation built on his incredible woodcuts printed in large editions and disseminated across Europe, firmly securing his place in the art historical canon. Dürer was the first German artist to portray peasants as esthetic subjects, capturing a growing self-confidence that had been stirring since the late 15th century. Dürer was also the first artist to both publish and copyright a book, and his 15 woodcuts depicting events from the Book of Revelations was widely circulated, thanks to the development of the printing press. Dürer's genius so dominated the art of the early bourgeois revolution in Germany that it has been called the Dürer epoch.

An innovative and prolific master, Rembrandt (1606 - 1669) is generally considered one of the greatest visual artists of all time, and the most important artist in Dutch art history.

LASTING IMPRESSIONS (CONTINUED)

Today it's his dramatic Baroque paintings which have become synonymous with the cultural achievements and immense prosperity of the great Dutch Golden Age. Many people are surprised to learn that it was the 300 etchings and dry points he produced between 1626 and 1665 which were responsible for the international reputation he enjoyed during his lifetime. Due to the large number of works produced they were widely circulated throughout Europe and quickly became sought after by collectors. One of the secrets of his success was his ability to combine imagination and spontaneity with a scrupulous eye for every last fine detail prompting the great Italian painter Guercino, in 1660 to praise Rembrandt as a printmaker describing him as a "great virtuoso." Interestingly Rembrandt also owned a large collection of prints by earlier masters including Albrecht Dürer.

Influenced by French and Italian painting and engraving, William Hogarth's works are mostly satirical caricatures, sometimes bawdily sexual, mostly of the first rank of realistic portraiture. He was the most significant artist of his generation and the first English-born artist to attract attention abroad. Hogarth invented the idea of a narrative series of prints, which told a story through a number of images, and he produced a significant number on "modern moral subjects" from prostitution to politics. His engravings often depict those trying to survive on the fringes of society and his prints are characterized by an incredible eye for detail (including many subtle puns and references), an often bawdy and ribald humor, and an ability to render striking and individual faces. In 1811 Charles Lamb writing about William Hogarth's work declared that Hogarth's images were filled with "the teeming, fruitful, suggestive meaning of words. Other pictures we look at; his pictures we read." After witnessing the widescale plagiarism of his first series of prints, A Harlot's Progress (1732) by competing engravers who produced cheap and inferior copies, Hogarth lobbied for the introduction of copyright protection for engravers. This was enacted in 1735, and became known as Hogarth's Law - it was one of the first of its kind in the world.

The Children's area will have street art, chalk, face and henna painting as well as story-telling and interactive games.



There will be fishing demonstrations on the Pier and a Tiny Tots soccer tournament in Heritage Park.



Michael Sandle is a British sculptor and print-maker and is most prominently known his sculptures commemorating and memorializing events from the First and Second World Wars. Sandle regards this preserving of memory as the most important role as a sculptor, saying, "one's identity is inseparable from memory, who we are and whether life is worth living or not. The concept of a nation is based on memory. History is always subject to review. Memory is far more important."

WWI Ghosts is a series images commissioned by the Canadian Cascadia Publications Group. Each image is drawn onto a copper plate using an acid resistant material—Then, the copper plate is immersed in an acid bath. The portions of the plate not covered by the drawing are dissolved by the acid, providing 3d dimensionality and relief to the resulting image. This series of images is intended to capture the tragedy and loss of the First World War. This chosen pieces emphasizes those feelings. In the forefront of the image is a lone soldier. In the background are the ghostly images of the friends and comrades that have been killed or lost. •

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
