# Message from the Director

Once again we find ourselves at the dawn of a new year, that unique moment where the passage of time is almost tangible and change is most palpable, best illustrated through the lengthening of days and the shrinking of shadows. For me it's also the one time I can wipe the slate clean, providing me with a psychological fresh start filled with all the possibilities found within the intentions we set for ourselves at the beginning of each year. Researchers have dubbed this term the "fresh start effect."

It's easy to be overwhelmed by the incomprehensible magnitude of it all, and as long as we have enjoyed free thought we have been trying to make sense of it. Creating institutions and entire industries to help explain and justify the mystery of our existence and the laws of the universe. Sadly many of our efforts to do so have only served to divide us, pitting one belief system against another.

As a child I had a brush with religion, and for a brief moment I actually had thoughts of attending the seminary with an eye of joining the priesthood. Looking back on that time I think this was more a symptom of finding a community where I felt included rather than a real deep rooted sense of belief in the doctrine and the institution. While that path was not meant to be, I have come to appreciate the value and role organized religion plays in building a sense of belonging, fostering and supporting community and the importance of ritual and ceremony in our lives.

A few years ago I had the opportunity to participate in an Ayahuasca ceremony and while in the throes of my journey inwards I found myself thinking about all the challenges in my life. As I sat there with my head in my hands, it suddenly dawned upon me that if all of my worldly problems were contained in my head they too fit within the palms of my hands. In that instant they suddenly became manageable, something I had a degree of control over. Everything else was external and beyond my control— as such I was finally able to free myself and let them go. I also recognize and for the sake of brevity, this is an oversimplified recounting of my journey, but it had a profound impact on how I have

since come to view and interact with the world around me.

We have all been challenged over the past few years and it's easy to become overwhelmed by the constant deluge of information we are fed each day. Sadly the old adage "If it bleeds it leads..." is more relevant today than ever. Bad news, war and misery remains more lucrative and ultimately profitable than peace, love and joy. Like compound interest the pressure is coming to bear and like turtles our instinct is to retreat, isolate and disconnect from each other to protect ourselves. The results of this transition are painfully evident and on full display on the streets of not only our city, but pretty much any community you will find yourself in.

I certainly don't believe we find ourselves here by accident, but we have the collective power to flip the switch and change the narrative. To do so we need to set our sights on something truly achievable starting with ourselves and a personal commitment to becoming a more engaged and an invested member of our community. We need to believe that we all have within us the capacity to become an agent of positive change and that our actions have the power to motivate, inspire and empower others. While this is not about changing the world, the ripple effects may spark "a pandemic of positivity" which could become contagious. We just need to believe where there is a will there is a way.

We can't manifest this destiny alone and to all of you who have felt alone, disconnected and disenfranchised please know there is a community here waiting for you with open arms, a safe and inclusive place where you can come and be yourself. For as long as our species has possessed free thought and an opposable thumb we have known of the transformative power of art in our lives. While we may never know the story behind the Venus of Willendorf, an 11.1-centimetre-tall (4.4 in) Venus figurine estimated to have been made around 25,000-30,000 years ago - its power still resonates to this day.

To that end I would like to invite you all to become more invested partners not only in the gallery, but all of our arts and culture organizations that provide safe spaces for creative expression. Looking back over our history, the arts have always been at the forefront of social change and more often than not it's the work of artists which remains as a permanent record and а testament of these changes. I am always hearing from others who have traveled how much they were inspired by the communities they visited which is inevitably followed by the question "Why can't we have that here?" The incredible answer is we can have it here, and with your help I believe that we can make Penticton a cultural capital to serve as a model and an inspiration for other communities to follow.

To help start the ball rolling we are excited to collaborate with a huge number of community partners to bring you the second annual Ignite the Arts Festival from March 24th -April 2<sup>nd</sup>. The week will be divided into two parts-the Community Weeks (March 24th-31th) and the Ignite the Arts Festival (March 31th -April 2<sup>nd</sup>). There will be an incredible mix of free and ticketed workshops, performances and events for individuals and families of all ages to satisfy your every need, wish and desire. There are lots of opportunities to get involved and we are looking for volunteers so please contact the gallery for more information on the range of opportunities available. Due to capacity issues tickets for the festival weekend are limited and are now on sale until we sell out. ### FEATURED ARTIST: Paul Kirschmann — Naramata Woodturner

Paul's first woodturning project was a full chess set at high school in Summerland. Turning then took a hiatus, but was never completely out of mind—the seeds were sown. After several paths of education and career, Paul ended up back in the Okanagan in Naramata. Woodturning began as a way to use local woods to make utilitarian pegs, pulls, and knobs for other furniture projects, but soon the fascination of turning itself became an obsession. Paul makes a variety of bowls, grinders, boxes and unique small items from mostly local rescued and found woods. Each piece is unique and handmade. In the future Paul would like to explore some of the historical technical aspects of woodturning such as handmade threads ("Thread Chasing"), and using his background in education to re-introduce woodturning to a younger generation.  $\blacklozenge$ 



### FEATURED ARTIST: Kathey Piros — Blue Quail Studio

Blue Quail Studio is the jewelry line, paintings and other artistic creations of artist Kathey Piros, who has been taking art classes since age 5 and is passionate about teaching both children and adults. She began focusing on glass fusing 11 years ago and uses large sheets of colored glass, often cut and arranged in unique ways and fused in a kiln. Some of her techniques include using dichroic and reactive glass and screenprinting and etching on the glass. A Canadian who spent the last 26 years living thoughout the US, Kathey recently moved back to BC to be closer to her roots. Her artwork has been nominated for a Martha Stewart "American Made" award, and has been sold in galleries in California, Washington, and BC.  $\blacklozenge$

### Education & Programming: All about Rebecca Stocker!

As I write this, I have just finished our last bit of programming in 2022 and have started work planning 2023's programming. In this liminal space between the old year and the new year-I find myself looking back on the successes and shortcomings of my first year working at the Penticton Art Gallery, additionally I find myself looking even further back to a time before I worked at the Gallery. I always get reflective and sentimental this time of year, and lucky for you lovely readers, our editor has given me the chance to write an article all about me.

I was born on a grey, rainy day in June in the late nineties and I spent my formative years in Penticton-I also spent my nonformative years in Penticton as wellwhich is to say I was born and raised in Penticton and spent most of my time here, except for the days I spent visiting my grandparents in Summerland. I of course said yes!

Since starting at the gallery I have had a lot of fun opportunities and experiences-I've gotten to teach people of all ages (although my favourites are probably the preschoolers, the kids, the tweens, and the teens- sorry adults!), I was a part at the inaugural Ignite the Arts Festival which was such a fun and unique experience. I've helped to host our First Fridays open mic nights with Daryl, I've started a Mail Art Program, I've built meaningful partnerships with other community arts and culture programs and I've even managed to merge my love of art with my other love of reading by starting the "Art of Reading Book Club" in conjunction with Stephanie from the Penticton Public Library.

Outside of work hours you can find me reading copious amounts- I try to read 100 hundred books every year and as of writing this I still have eight more books to read, so wish me luck. You can also find me drawing, knitting, embroidering, lurking in the aisles of Value Village hunting for the next great deal, braiding my hair, writing bad poetry, or spending time with my husband Carson, and dog Winnie (who are both fantastic and furry). 

### Week 1 — March 20th to 24th — Cartoon Mania


Learn about the history of cartoons, how to draw cartoons, caricatures, and comics, experience famous works by comic and cartoon artists and have fun making art!


### Preschool Art








### Afterschool Partnership with Foundry



Jessie Brennan is a multidisciplinary artist and entrepreneur based in Penticton, BC. and Harry Clarke collide with contemporary artists such as Lili Arnold and Kathleen Neeley, blending at times bold and surrealistic colour with a delicate attention to the power of negative space. Brennan studied art briefly at University of the Fraser Valley and graduated with honours from Vancouver Film School's Makeup for Film and Television program where she won the Class Achievement Award and third place at the 2019 nternational Makeup Artist Trade Show London Battle of the Brushes. Her studio is located inside Speckled Row pottery studio at the Cannery Trade Center in Penticton.

Chapter One — Art is All Over: The Art of the Story 1:00 pm Saturday January 28th

The first instalment will be mostly biographical, painting a picture and setting the table for all that which will unfold over the course of this series of lectures. I invite you to join me on this journey as I share the art of my life and the incredible people, places and

history I have found in the most unexpected of ways and places over the past 30 years of my life. Art is all over and one can find anything anywhere. While this is the story of my life its also the story of all the people I have met along the way and the incredible history their work represents. The art of the story is a work of creative non fiction and in those moments where I need to fill in the blanks I'll heed the advice my dear friend Toni Onley once gave me: **"don't let the truth get in the way of a good story..."** 

### Chapter Two — Two Young Canadian Artists: At Home and Abroad — Part 1, Ronald Bladen (1918-1988) "A Picture is worth a thousand words..." 1:00 pm Saturday February 18, 2023

The first of this two part lecture will feature the work of Ronald Bladen (1918-1988), one of two artists included in the travelling exhibition, Two Young Canadian Artists: At Home and Abroad, first displayed at the Vancouver Art Gallery from January 22 – February 10, 1946 and then in Victoria where it was displayed at the Little Centre from October 8th – 20th, 1946.

We will explore the trajectories of each of these artists's careers and look at the incredible impact they both had on the art world and art history beyond the borders of Canada yet they both remain largely unknown here in Canada outside of occasionally showing up as a footnote in Canadian art history texts. In the catalogue that accompanied the exhibition Ina D.D. Uhthoff, a noted painter, art critic, educator a and friend of Emily Carr wrote the following about Ronald Bladen:

"A young artist who will go far: 'Ronnie' Bladen who is a native of Victoria, began to draw and paint in a manner that was entirely his own. His outlook and approach were simple, his style strong and restrained. A love of lines - beautiful and expressive – characterized his work. His canvases were virile, expressing mood. In 1936 'Ronnie' went to San Francisco to study art. The work of the average Art School did not give him all he needed. He was always an individualist. He had something to express ... he must express it as he felt it. He worked as a muralist in San Francisco, having several important commissions. This year he has been awarded a major scholarship to enable him to study in New York."

Sometimes art is exaggerated and abstracted, but still grounded in reality. Sometimes artists will take that exaggeration to the limit, pushing the depiction until just short of it becoming unrecognizable. During his early career, Joseph Plaskett became an expert at finding that limit. The Plant #4 is an demonstration excellent of how abstracted a subject can be, while still being recognizable. It was painted in 1950, during his time living in Paris, France.

Joseph Plaskett was born in 1918, in New Westminster, British Columbia. Early in his adulthood, he travelled and studied art in multiple places within North America. Along the way, meeting and studying alonside famed artists such as Lawren



Harris, of the Group of Seven. During the 1950s he cycled between Canada and Paris, before settling down in Paris in 1957. In 2004, he created The Joe Plaskett Foundation to provide funding for emerging Canadian artists to study abroad. He passed away in 2014. ♦

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
