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

Message from the Director



Over the past few months, a series of impactful events has unfolded, affecting me personally, the Penticton Art Gallery, and our entire arts and culture community. We kicked off our anniversary celebration partnering with the En'owkin Centre to remarkable exhibition. commemorating the 20th anniversary of their National Indigenous Professional Artist Training Program. Additionally, we collaborated with numerous community partners and organizations to present the highly successful second annual Ignite the Arts Festival, which also included the Confluence Conference, a collaboration between the En'owkin Centre and the 2Rivers Remix Society.

Over the past few months, we've faced a difficult challenge due to the City's announcement to cut our annual operating funding. Despite receiving relatively stable and consistent funding over the years, we were taken aback when we learned that our core funding would be reduced by \$70,000 from \$125,000 to \$55,000. This amount may not seem significant to some, but it is important to note that it is lower than what the gallery received from the City when I first started here in 2006. While we

are grateful to have seen a temporary reprieve with the return of our core funding level, this experience serves as an important reminder of the precarious nature of not only our funding, but also that of all our community partners. It highlights the need for us to work together to ensure the long-term sustainability of arts and culture in our community.

Reflecting back over the 17 years I have lived and worked in Penticton, I have seen our arts & culture community experience many highs and definitely a few lows. Based on our community's track record, it's easy to see how one might expect that these cuts might have gone relatively unnoticed or at least without much pushback. Shortly after I moved to Penticton, the City lost the much loved Pen High Auditorium, an institution I sadly never had an opportunity to visit. While the loss of this important cultural amenity did illicit considerable public protest and debate at the time, it was offset by a verbal commitment from the powers that be that it would be replaced with a new performing arts facility located in the downtown core. In years that have followed, and in spite of the heroic efforts of the Penmar Community Arts Society and the South Okanagan Performing Arts Centre Society, we have yet to see the City move forward with this commitment.

Its also interesting to note that after the old Penmar building was purchased by a winery in 2015, the Penmar Community Arts Society changed its focus to a provincial one, relocating their operations to Surrey in 2016, where it continues to operate under the same name in support of live music venues and events throughout southern British Columbia.

For many years, the Penticton & District

Community Arts Council successfully ran the Street Art Festival and the Arts Rising Festival. The colourful and vibrant murals and artwork created during these events can still be seen on numerous buildings and back alleys throughout the downtown core. Both of these events brought the community together in a positive and meaningful way, adding to the cultural richness of our city which is still evident today.

The Penticton Arts Awards were another incredible initiative of the Arts Council, bringing the community together to celebrate and recognize the incredible depth of talent that resides within our city. These awards introduced me to a number of talented artists whose life and work I would have never known about otherwise. Sadly, due to capacity issues brought on by limited staffing and financial resources, the Arts Council had to give up on these three incredible programs.

Although the Penticton & District Community Arts Council still continues to make an impact on our community, their capacity to do more is limited by their scarce resources. It is unfortunate that these important programs had to be discontinued, as they added so much value and brought people together in a way that is difficult to replicate. It is crucial that we recognize and support organizations such as the Penticton & District Community Arts Council in our community, as they play a vital and critical role in our city's cultural and economic prosperity.

I am also so grateful for having been able to experience the incredible Okanagan International Children's Festival which placed the gallery smack in the middle of all that was going on with tents and stages up in Okanagan Lake Park and Marina Way Park. The festival always amazed me with its ability to pull off such a great event every year, introducing me to artists like Al Simmons

and Fred Penner, whom I went on to work with as part of the ArtsWells Festival and now with the Ignite the Arts Festival. The palpable energy at events like this is incredible - I loved seeing how kids and parents alike responded to it. While Penticton lost an important event, the recent addition of the HaHaHa Kidzfest Festival is a welcome development. It will provide countless more children and youth with the same sense of joy, wonder, and discovery in the years to come. The impact of these events cannot be understated - they leave a lasting impression on those who participate and attend.

The impact of these losses on our community's cultural fabric cannot be overstated. The vulnerability of the nonprofit arts and culture sector is just the tip of the iceberg. In the last 17 years, we witnessed the rise and fall of several music festivals, including the Rock the Peach Festival and the Boonstock Music Festival. We also experienced the loss of beloved underground events like Rustic Robot and the Folkanagan Festival, which had a profound impact on our community's artistic vitality. Moreover, local venues such as the Hogs Breath Cafe and the Elite were more than just places to enjoy live music - they were community living-rooms - providing a fertile ground for developing the next generation of talent and allowing them to hone their skills. All of these losses have significantly weakened our community's social fabric, further underscoring the importance of supporting and nurturing the arts and culture sector.

In more recent years, the Okanagan School of the Arts and the Shatford Centre had the potential to become a major cultural destination, building on the reputation and storied history of the Okanagan Summer School of the Arts. The building and location seemed perfect, and despite having significant support, the challenges of maintaining building, uncertainties the complications surrounding its ownership and lease made it untenable to move forward. Sadly, the Okanagan School of the Arts had to give up the building, and without space to regularly run programming, it was only a matter of time before they could no longer maintain paid staff. This past spring, they

were forced to let go of the last remaining staff person, making it a board-run organization once again. While I have no doubt they will weather this storm as they have in the past, it serves as one more stark reminder of what we all stand to lose if we don't all become more proactive and engaged in the ongoing support of these organizations and cultural touchstones in our community.

My intention in sharing these examples is not to rub salt in the wounds of those who poured their time, passion, money, and resources into building and maintaining these dreams. Rather, I want them to know that some of us still remember and appreciate their efforts. More importantly, I aim to highlight the stark reality that these institutions often vanish with little fanfare, leaving a cultural void that goes largely unnoticed by the wider public. This sobering truth underscores the immense challenges faced by individuals or small groups who are driven by their passion to make a difference in their communities.

As a community, we must recognize that the arts are not a luxury, but a fundamental aspect of our society that enriches our lives and drives our economy. It is imperative that we come together to ensure that our artists and cultural organizations have the support they need to thrive and continue to contribute to the fabric of our community. Funding is important, but it is equally crucial that we value the role that arts and culture play in creating safe, vibrant, and dynamic communities that are economically and socially sustainable.

The recent cuts in funding highlighted the urgent need for us to come together and build a stronger, more vibrant, and cohesive community that celebrates and embraces the arts. We must raise awareness and advocate for the importance of arts and culture, both morally and financially, to ensure that the City of Penticton continues to support our arts and culture community.

I want to express my gratitude to

everyone who has stood up and supported not only the Penticton Art Gallery and Ignite the Arts Festival but all of our incredible cultural institutions and community partners. We must recognize that this is not just about funding but about our values and the vital role that art and culture plays in our lives, community, and the future of Penticton.

As continue this important we conversation, I urge you to join us in our mission to create a place that we all want to live, work and play in - a place that will be the envy of every community in the province, a place that visitors will talk about to their own communities, a place that will serve as a model for others to try and replicate. We envision a place that truly feels like home, and your support is crucial in making this vision a reality. Together, we can create a community that not only survives but thrives for generations to come. •

FEATURED ARTIST: Carol Munro



We are thrilled to present Carol Munro as our featured artist for the May/ June edition. After retiring from a career in teaching, writing, and broadcasting, Carol turned to her passion for art full-time.

As a keen observer of her surroundings, Carol is intrigued by the idea that all of our visual experiences occur within our own minds. Her paintings merge the outer and inner worlds, presenting landscapes that are filtered, slanted, projected, and transformed by the mind's eye and the artist's hand. Carol believes that if the act of seeing takes place within ourselves, then the landscapes we view are of our own creation.

She explains, "Each painting is a fanciful cartography of the journey between you and me." Carol's artwork focuses on revealing the hidden layers of a scene, much like an archaeological dig. She utilizes traditional watercolor/ink techniques along with an array of digital brushes to lift, place, dissect, and

excavate the layers of her pieces. Layer after layer, the process reveals fresh surfaces, enabling her to move seamlessly among the brushstrokes.

Carol describes her creative process by saying, "The initial layer now floats on the surface, intertwined with the trail of its own journey. In our ends, our beginnings are mapped." She is excited to showcase this new direction in her work, and we're confident that you'll enjoy it too.

Carol's friend and first teacher, Chinese brush master Lam Chin Shek, has been at the root of all her art over the past 45 years. She keeps a favorite photo from "the old days" in her studio, where today meets yesterday in her work.



Nature's Reverie

Meadowlark Festival 2023 Featured Artist, Stephanie Perry

Exhibition Opening event: May 19th @ 7pm Artist Talk May 20th @ 1pm

Stephanie Perry joins the Penticton Art Gallery for her exhibit "Nature's Reverie" in collaboration with the Meadowlark Bird Festival.



Stephanie was raised on the Northern most tip of Vancouver island in the small fishing village of Port Hardy BC, an upbringing that serves as inspiration for much of her work. Her love of adventure set her to leave the remote north island after highschool and get her diploma in Visual Arts from Camosun College and then go further to obtain her degree in fine arts from Concordia Montreal. During her time there she met her



husband Michael Perry in painting and drawing class, which led to them returning to the west together after the program. Setting down roots for 12 years in Calgary which was her husband's hometown, Stephanie obtained a teaching degree from the University of Calgary and began a short career teaching art in secondary schools throughout Calgary. After having their first child, Stephanie decided to stay at home and work on her craft whilst raising her growing family. Looking for a change in scenery the Perry's moved to Penticton in 2015. She now paints full time while balancing homeschool life with her 2 children. She has paintings residing in collections throughout North America, Europe and Australia and continues to participate in arts and cultural events through the sale of her work.




"The Call of the Meadowlark" 2023, acrylic on canvas, 18"x24"

"Natures Reverie" is a collection of Stephanie's recent work within the last decade. Work that depicts her strong connection and interest in the natural world, and her desire to visually represent the emotions embodied in those connections. Her paintings describe a spiritual element in the happenings of nature. The divine embodiment of all that occurs, that was made to live in symbiosis with not only other elements of nature, but of ourselves as we are part of the landscape as well and not just passive observers.

In Stephanie's words, "My process begins with concepts that I sketch using watercolors on paper, and a variety of ink, pens and acrylic paint to achieve compositions that utilize vibrant color and patterning. I employ the use of metallic paint and pens, Indian dot painting techniques, and traditional painting methods to create bold works that are whimsical, fantastical and surreal while still juxtaposing the "real", so that I can honor the creatures of nature with the reverence that is deserved.

"This year, the 2023 Meadowlark painting "the Call of the Meadowlark" depicts the preciousness of the gift that nature delivers to all of us. In the case of the meadowlark, the gift is the song and the song represents the light. Perry began to visualize the song being like a pearl inside the mouth of the bird, slowly growing and becoming more beautiful and precious and for it to shape the world around it into something that emanated light and bold colors.

"Events such as the Meadowlark Festival remind the public about the beauty of animal life and the importance of the natural environment. To work towards protecting against human destruction of precious ecosystems through education and teaching. I was thrilled to be chosen to be part of it and for my work to represent this year's efforts in reaching more minds and connecting with a wider audience." •

For this year's show, we are presenting "Spirit Masks" created by students in our grade 9/10 classes. These masks allowed students an opportunity to explore creative designs and clay hand building techniques. I always enjoy seeing the wide variety of designs and influences that play into these final sculptures.

The grade 11 and 12 students were introduced to the challenge of producing a self-portrait in charcoal. However, unlike a traditional portrait, students were asked to alter their image by using filters on their cell phones that twist and contort their images of themselves. The final drawings are big, bold, and really drive home the power of charcoal as a medium and how it enhances these "twisted" portraits.

We hope you enjoy the work submitted this year. The wide variety of masks and portraits remind us of all the power of visual expression. It is so important that we recognize the critical role the visual arts offer our young people as they navigate their way in the world. The risks we take as artists help build our sense of confidence and allow us an opportunity to express our unique qualities that define each one of us."

"As always, it has been a busy year in the studio at Pen High. The students are excited to be part of this show and display their hard work. I am a firm believer that continuing with Arts Education at a High School level helps students to creatively solve problems and persevere through challenges. The Arts promote creative and critical thinking, social and emotional development, self-worth, and cognitive growth. Seeing a large project through to the end takes concentration and commitment which are skills out students will need as they grow into their adult lives.

Grade 9 and 10 students have worked on technical drawing observation skills to create graphite portraits. These students continued using these skills and had fun studying Edvard Munch's The Scream, which they turned into acrylic parodies. The seniors studied architectural Gargoyles and have created large charcoal studies as well as ceramic sculptures of the grotesques. In conjunction with the Meadowlark festival, the grade 11 & 12 students have created mixed media compositions with an environmental theme. They were given the choice to either celebrate the local flora and fauna or use their voice to highlight an environmental issue that they felt passionate about.

"The Art Program at Summerland Secondary is made up of a diverse group of students. The programs consist of traditional studio art classes and traditional film photography. As their teacher, I am always looking to my students to identify interests and skill levels in order to create projects that meet the needs of all learners. The fear of failure and personal expectation to create perfect work right away, without any training, frequently stifles creativity and motivation. I often encourage students as they work through negative self-talk (though many times to an outsider, their work is amazing) and can be heard repeating the phrase "it's all practice" to help them let go and move toward a more helpful frame of mind. I have told many students they are welcome to rip up their work if they hate it (after I mark it and document it, of course). Usually, they don't. They see their work with new eyes and by the end are so proud of it, and rightly so. Their dedication to improving technique and sharing their insights is powerful. I love that I get to help them and see their success."




Usually held in June, This year the Penticton Art Gallery Auction will be held a little later in the year—we are happy to announce the return of this event on September 16th!

Sometimes artists will take exaggeration to the limit, pushing the depiction until just short of it

Or there was never a specific subject to being with, and the design was always meant to be abstract. I don't know which this piece of art falls under. Painted in 1963 by Toni Onley, this piece was left untitled. Without a title, without notes on what it is supposed to represent we are left to derive our own meaning for the art.

I don't like this piece. I prefer art that is stylized and exaggerated, but still recognizable. I prefer art with colours. This brings an important point for art galleries, and art in general. We don't have to like the art to understand that it is important or worth preserving. I don't like this piece of art, nor do I understand what it is trying to convey, but I can understand that Toni Onley fits into our collection so the art is worth preserving! •


